The Second Ancestor Swap Meet was held Saturday, June 24, 2000 at the Norman Activity Center, 526 E. Commerce St., Jacksonville, Texas 75766. The participants spent time finding information on our ancestors in the portable files from information submitted by the participants and other researchers. Bernard Mayfield told about the Historical Markers erected and to be erected this year in Cherokee County. Mary Darby Taylor spoke about **Mother Goose in Politics, Yikes!** Ogreta W. Huttash was available to assist in research. Virginia and Grady Singletary represented the Stella Hill Memorial Library and brought the library's collection of historic photographs. Eleanor Oliver and Linda Stogner represented the Athens Genealogical Organization and Henderson County Historical Commission and sold books from those organizations. Gene Tannery the author of **The Tannerys Young and Old** attended and had his book for sale. R. L. McGuire, Jr., President, Cherokee County Genealogical Society announced the publication and demonstrated the new CD-ROM **Tree Talk Twenty - Five Years 1975 -2000**. Participants attended from Texas, Florida, Oklahoma, Arkansas, New York, Louisiana, and New Mexico.

The International Standard Book Number (ISBN) is a 10-digit number that uniquely identifies books and book-like products published internationally. The purpose of the ISBN is to identify one title or edition from one specific publisher and is unique to that edition. The ISBN allows for more efficient marketing of products to booksellers, universities, wholesalers, distributors and agents. The ISBN is an important part of the cataloging process used by libraries. Once the documentation for each publication is submitted, information about that publication is printed in R. R. Bowker's **Books in Print**. **Books in Print** is a reference tool listing book products published and distributed in the U.S. by over 62,400 publishers.

(continued from previous issue)

Monday Morning 15 Nov 1847

Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment, same members present as on Saturday, except **Bro. Killough**, and constituted with prayer.

**Bro. Matthew J. Edmonson** being present and having rendered a satisfactory excuse for his absence heretofore, since the present meeting of the Presbytery took his seat as the representative from the congregation at Crockett.

Minutes of the Fall Session 1847

On Motion, **Bro Lewis Ruter**, a Licentiate from the Texas Presbytery, presented his letter of dismissal and recommendation and was received under the care of this Presbytery and it is ordered that **Bro. Ruter** be requested to supply his immediate neighborhood, and elsewhere as he may be enabled to do, with preaching until the meeting of the Presbytery next spring.

On Motion, resolved that the members of the different congregations within the bounds of this Presbytery be requested through their respective Eldershops to contribute at least the sum of ten cents each for the purpose of raising a Presbyterian fund to defray the necessary expense of their representatives to Synod and the General Assembly.

And be it further resolved that they be also requested to contribute a sufficient amount of money . specially to defray the expenses of our Commissioner to the next General Assembly.

On Motion, ordered that the Clerk transmit a copy of these minutes to the Editor of the Texas Presbyterian at the City of Houston for publication.

On motion of **Bro. McDonald**, Resolved unanimously that the thanks of the Presbytery be respectfully tendered to the Brethren and Citizens of Palestine and its (?) for their kind hospitality and good treatment of the Presbytery during its present \_(?) and Presbytery asks leave to - (?) their?) for the regular attendance of brethren and citizens, their uniform, good discussion during the hour service on the present occasion.

And their being no further business before the Presbytery, it adjourned until the Friday before the second Sabbath in March next, to meet at the town of Rusk in the County of Cherokee, and concluded with prayer by the Moderator.

Trinity Presbytery, pursuant to adjournment, now at Rusk in the County of Cherokee on Friday before the 2nd Sabbath, being the 10th day of March in the year of our Lord 1848.

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Ministers present: **James McDonald, Thomas L. Wilshire, James B. Warren, D. C. Nevills, and Robt. Gilkerson.**

Licentiate present: **Archibald Watkins** Elders present: **Nathaniel Killough** from New Providence congregation and **Thomas J. Moore** from Montvale congregation and **Matthew J. Edmiston** from the Trinity and Ebenezer congregations.

Ministers absent: **Mitchell Smith** and **Solomon Awalt**. Candidate absent: **Malcolm Grayson**.

On Motion: And a congregation not being present (?) , constituted by prayer.

On Motion, (?) **Bro. Thomas L. Wilshire** was chosen Moderator to preside at the present session of Presbytery and **Bro. J. B. Harris**, the former moderator, withdrew and the Moderator-elect took the chair.

On Motion, The (?) congregation on Rabbit Creek recently organized by **Bro. Thomas L. Wilshire** was received under the care of this Presbytery and **Elder Win. J. Gray** their representative being present, took his seat.

On Motion, The brethren were called on to make their reports in relation to their ministerial labors(?) since last meeting of Presbytery, which reports were respectively made and received.

**Bro. Samuel Harris**, an ordained minister in the C.P. Church from the Arkansas Presbytery, having forwarded his letter of dismissal and recommendation, with a request to become a member of this Presbytery, ordered that the letter of **Bro. Harris** be received and that he be admitted as a member of this Presbytery.

**Bro. R. O. Wadkins**, an ordained minister from the Texas Presbytery of the C.P. Church being present was invited and took his seat as a corresponding member at the present session of this Presbytery.

On motion, **Brothers McDonald, Nevills** and **Killough** are appointed a Committee on necessary preparations were in progress and that the building was under contract and a proposition made to employ a teacher whose answer is not yet received. And it was further shared that **Bro. Samuel Harris, Mr. William Hendson** and **Major Petri** be appointed additional trustees for said institution, which was accordingly done.

On Motion, And whereas **Bro. Richard Martin**, who is present, is a Licentiate in the ministry of the C.P. Church and has produced his letter of discussion and recommendation as such Licentiate from Charity Hall Presbytery of the C.P. Church, State of Mississippi and requests that he be taken under the care of this Presbytery. Therefore, resolved that **Bro. Martin** be taken under the care of this Presbytery..

On Motion, And it appearing that **Bro. James McDonald** cannot attend the meeting of the next General Assembly of the C.P. Church, to be held in Memphis, Tennessee this spring, therefore ordered that his appointment be rescinded and that **Bro. D. C. Nevills** be appointed to attend in his stead.

On motion, Ordered that the Clerk make out and hand to **Bro. Orion Hatch** a certified copy of the preamble and resolution, together with this order adopted At the present session of Presbytery in relation to his becoming a member of this Presbytery.

On Motion, ordered that brethren **James B. Harris, Benj. B. Cannon,** and **Matthew J. Edmiston** be a (committee on ?) church books to report as soon as practicable at next session.

On Motion, Presbytery concluded with prayer and adjourned until tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock

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## Cumberland Presbyterian Church Minutes 1846 to 1862

Saturday Morning, 8 O'clock, 1 Ith March, 1848

Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment. Present same members as on yesterday and constituted with prayer.

On motion, The minutes of the last meeting of Presbytery read and also the minutes Of Yesterday were read and approved-

On motion, and whereas **Bro. Orion Hatch** has submitted to this Presbytery through one of its members satisfactory information of his being an ordained minister in the Methodist ? Church , at the same time making application for admission as a member of this Presbytery and whereas the applicant is not present with his letter of dismissal from the Methodist Episcopal Church,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that **Bro. Orion Hatch** be taken under the care of this Presbytery and he labor as a minister of Christ when and where he may think proper, until the next meeting of Presbytery when he is requested to attend for the purpose of being examined preparatory to his becoming a member of this Presbytery.

On motion, **Bro. Killough** reported in compliance with a resolution of last meeting of (Presbytery relating to a Presbyterian School about being established at or near New Providence meeting house, that through a committee to examine and report upon the scientific(?) (and?) theological acquirement of **Bro. Wadkins**, preparatory to to being set apart to the whole work of this ministry by (vote?) at next meeting of Presbytery. And it is further ordered should **Bro. A. Wadkins** be ? on final examination at next meeting of Presbytery be found to possess the necessary qualification, his ordination shall then take place and **Bro James B. Harris(?)** is appointed to preach his ordination sermon, **Bro. McDonald** to preside and give the charge.

On Motion, ordered that the order of last meeting of Presbytery in relation to **Bro. J. B. Harris'** ministerial labors be renewed and continued until next meeting.

On Motion, ordered that **Bro. D. C. Nevills** supply the Trinity congregation at Crockett and Ebenezer congregation with preaching regularly once a month each, and the residue of his time devote in preaching to the Palestine and Mound Prairie congregations as circumstances may enable him to do until next meeting of Presbytery.

On Motion, Ordered that **Bro. Thomas L. Willshire** supply the congregation. in which he resides and also the ? congregation on Rabbitt Creek with preaching each one-fourth of his time. And the residue of his time devote to preaching elsewhere as he may be enabled to do until next meeting of Presbytery.

On Motion, ordered that **Bro. Robert Gilkerson** supply his neighborhood and the neighborhoods adjacent thereto with preaching as circumstances may enable him to do, until next meeting of Presbytery.

### Minutes of Spring Session 1848

The Committee on Church Books makes the following report: "That they have performed the duty assigned to them and find the minutes of New Providence and Montvale Churches incomplete, there being no record of meetings and proceedings of sessions, and that Clerks of sessions be instructed to place before the church books on all meetings and proceedings of each and every session." Which report was received and adopted and the committee discharged.

On Motion, ordered that a camp meeting be held embracing the 2nd Sabbath in October next at the new campground near New Providence Church meeting house in Cherokee County.

In compliance with a Resolution of the last meeting of Presbytery, **Bro. D. C. Nevills** made the following special report , viz: "Agreeable to an order of Presbytery, I report that there are twenty-one Communicants in the Trinity Church of Crockett, five removals, no dismissions or excommunications.

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Ebenezer Congregation, eight or eighteen(?) Communicants, no excommunications or dismissions. Palestine congregation, 8 members in communion, no excommunications or dismissions. Mound Prairie Church, eleven communicants, dismissions - none, excommunications - none." Which report was received and ordered to be spread upon the minutes.

On Motion, Ordered that a protracted meeting be held at Crockett, embracing the 4th Sabbath in September next and at Ebenezer Church embracing the 2nd Sabbath in the same month.

On Motion, Ordered that a protracted meeting be held at the meeting house in **Bro. Wilcher's** neighborhood, embracing the 4th Sabbath in August next; also a protracted meeting at Union Church on Rabbit Creek embracing the -4th(?) Sabbath in Sept. next.

**Bro. Willshire** makes the following special ? that in the bounds of his ministerial service there are five Communicants belonging to congregation in the neighborhood in which he resides twenty in Union Congregation and seven members of the ? Church in his said bounds who do not belong to any particular congregation at present, making thirty-six members in said bounds. Which report was received and ordered to be spread upon the minutes.

**Bro. Harris** makes the following special report: That in compliance with an order of last meeting of Presbytery, he reports that in Montvale congregation are twenty-five communicants and in New Providence congregation there are thirty-two communicants. In all, fifty-seven members in the bounds of his ministerial operations and that he has no personal knowledge of any others in said bounds but has been informed that there are others who do not belong to any particular congregation. Which report is received and ordered to be spread upon the minutes.

The Presbytery, on Motion, proceeded to ? of a Treasurer, when **Bro. Nathaniel Killough** was unanimously elected Treasurer of this Presbytery.

There was handed into the hands of the Treasurer the sum of two dollars and ten cents, the amount that had been collected for the purpose of creating a presbyterial fund for Presbyterial purposes.

On Motion, And **Bro. John Becton**, an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church being present, he is invited to a seat as corresponding member of this Presbytery at its present session.

The committee to whom was referred the examination of candidates and Licentiates for the ministry made the following report, viz:

"That they have examined the brethren **A. Wadkins** and **Richard Martin** on the Sciences originally and on theology particularly and find them orthodox in doctrine, but on Literature and the Sciences they seem not so well prepared to undergo an examination. The committee therefore recommends that they should review those literary and scientific subjects recommended by our book of discipline that they may be better prepared for a final examination before ordination." Which report was received and ordered to be spread on the minutes.

On Motion, Resolved that the thanks of Presbytery be tendered to the citizens of the Town of Rusk and its vicinity for their kind treatment of and courteous demeanor toward the members of this Presbytery during this present session.

On Motion, And there being no further business before Presbytery ordered that Presbytery adjourn until the Friday before the last Sabbath in October next, at 11 o'clock A.M. in **Bro. Robert Wilkerson's** neighborhood in the county of Rusk.

On motion, Further ordered that the Clerk forward a copy of these minutes to the Editor of the Texas Presbyterian publication. And Presbytery concluded with prayer.

## Cumberland Presbyterian Church Minutes 1846 to 1862

Rusk County, Texas, Friday 27 Oct, 1848

At the meeting house in **Bro. Robert Gilkerson's** neighborhood in the county of Rusk on Friday before the last Sabbath in October in the year of our Lord 1848, Trinity Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment, members present.

Ministers: **James B. Harris, D. C. Nevills,** and **Robert Gilkerson** Elders: **Daniel Murchison** from Trinity church, **A. D. Coupland** from New Providence and **Benj. B. Cannon** from Montvale church. Ministers absent: **Thomas L. Wilshire, James McDonald, Solomon Awalt, Sam B. Harris,** and **Mitchell Smith.** Licentiate absent: **Richard Martin.** Licentiate Candidate absent: **Malcomb Guinn (or Gwinn?).**

The former Moderator being absent and there being no congregation present, **Bro. J. B. Harris** was called to the chair and there being a quorum present, On Motion, Presbytery was called to order and constituted with prayer. On Motion, **Bro. D. C. Nevills**, having been nominated, was unanimously elected Moderator and thereupon **Bro. B. B. Cannon**, stated Clerk, was called upon to read the minutes of the last meeting of Presbytery, which was accordingly done.

On motion, **Bros. J. B. Harris, Robt. Gilkerson,** and **B. B. Cannon** were appointed a committee to examine **Bro. Orion Hatch** on Literature and the Science Church Government History and theology, preparatory to his admission as a member of this Presbytery in compliance with a resolution of last meeting of Presbytery and

On Motion, Presbytery had a recess of half an hour and, commencing again, said Committee reported as follows, Viz: "That they have performed the duty assigned to them and that **Bro. Hatch** produced satisfactory evidence of his being an ordained Elder in the Methodist Episcopal Church and that, on his examination, he gave entire satisfaction. We therefore recommend that **Bro. Hatch** be admitted a member of this Presbytery." Which report was concurred in, whereupon, **Bro. Hatch** was introduced; and the second and third questions required by our Confession of Faith to be proposed to candidates for the ministry were propounded to him by the Moderator and answered by him in the affirmative, when the right hand of fellowship was given to him by the ministers of the Presbytery to take part with them in their ministry, and **Bro. Hatch** took his seat as a member of this Presbytery.

Presbytery adjourned to meet at the Mission of **Bro. Gilkerson** at early candle lighting this evening and concluded with Prayer.

Friday Evening 25 October, 1848

Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment and constituted with prayer, when.....**Brethren Thos. L Willshire, James McDonald** and **Mitchell Smith**, Ministers; **Lewis Reuter**, Licentiate, and Elder **Win. C. Lee** from Union Church appeared, rendered their excuses for absences, respectively, and their excuses being sustained, these brethren (except **Bro. Reuter**) took their seats. And **Bro. Elisha Moon**, an Elder from Mount Hope Church (being one of the churches represented by **Bro. Lee**) was invited to take a seat as corresponding member at this present session of Presbytery. On Motion of **Bro. McDonald** supported by some appropriate remarks, an invitation was given for any who might be desirous of becoming a candidate for the ministry to make it known by presenting themselves. Whereupon **Bro. Andrew J. Coupland** and **James L. Payne** did so and severally(?) related their religious experience and internal call to the ministry, were taken under the care of the Presbytery. And **Bro. Coupland** was directed to prepare a written discourse from 7th verse of 3rd chapter of John's Gospel and **Bro. Payne** a written discourse from the 1st clause of 36th verse, 3rd chapter of John's Gospel to be read at next regular meeting of Presbytery.

## SELMAN - ROARK CEMETERY

IN 1834 SURVEYOR WILLIAM ROARK (1803-1862) AND HIS FAMILY CAME TO TEXAS FROM TENNESSEE. ROARK'S MOTHER NANCY (CHAMBLISS) AND BROTHER NAPOLEON WERE BURIED IN THE ONE-HALF-ACRE GRAVEYARD ABOUT 1837-38. JOSEPH, DELILA, AND JAMES H. DURST DEEDED THIS CEMETERY TO ROARK IN 1838. ROARK'S DAUGHTER ELIZABETH MARRIED BENJAMIN FRANKLIN SELMAN IN 1855 AND THE SITE BECAME KNOWN AS "SELMAN-ROARK CEMETERY." AS LINWOOD COMMUNITY GREW, MORE FAMILIES USED THE BURIAL GROUND, IN 1961 A ROARK DESCENDANT DEEDED AN ADDITIONAL 0.8 ACRE ADJOINING THE CEMETERY.

### SELMAN - ROARK CEMETERY

This cemetery is located on Highway 21 about 5 miles east of Alto, Texas. It is the oldest cemetery by deed in Cherokee County, Texas. It was copied 16 October 1997 by Mrs. Lou Rogers and Mrs. Ogreta W. Huttash. Some of the stones are cracked. Some graves are of native rock, some of sawed rock. Some are in bad shape from being "cleaned" by bleaches or something similar. Checked and updated in May 2000 by Ogreta Huttash and Gaylon White.

Bean, Candace Midkiff 1802 - Dec 1848 wife of Peter Bean.

### CANDACE MIDKIFF BEAN

Wife of Peter Ellis Bean, born near Nashville, Tenn., in 1802, died near Douglass, Texas in December, 1848. One of those Pioneer women who braved the Indian menace and rocked the Cradle of Texas Liberty. -- 1936 Texas Centennial Marker

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## **Reynolds Kids**

The following is typical of many turn-of-the-century community schools in Cherokee County, Texas. Information came from CHEROKEE COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION and from those who actually attended Reynolds School, or descended from someone who did, the article is from a REYNOLDS school reunion in 1988. The photos are from the files of my mother, the late Eva Shelton Todd. No one remembers exact dates but the school started out as PINEY GROVE, said to have been in a log house located on the site of present TECULA cemetery. The school moved to the south side of the county road probably in the mid 1890s and became REYNOLDS school. The school well is still there. The new REYNOLDS school, on the north side of the road, started in the 1929 school year when I started to school. It too is gone now, the school having consolidated with Jacksonville in the 1950's.

### THE KIDS OF REYNOLDS SCHOOL

#### WE ARE UNIQUE KIDS!

We are a part of the past, and the past is a part of us. We are from a time in history that is no more. Although time is in the past, the memories and experiences are still shared by us all.

We are the kids that walked to school because parents were the ones who got to use the family car. Those long walks have provided many a story to our children and grandchildren. Our loved ones have been reminded several times how we walked through winter rain and snow over miles of muddy roads.

Our schoolhouse was different from the schools of today. It was white with rows of high windows. Most of the time our school had three grades in one room, not one room for each grade. In the back of each room sat a big wood burning stove. For those gathered around this stove waiting for school to begin, many a yarn was heard. In later years butane heaters were installed, and the aroma of the wood burning stove was forever gone. Our school didn't have lockers for coats and books. Coats were hung on hooks placed along the wall, and our books were kept in our desks.

In the early beginnings of our school, students were without a lunchroom. Lunch for those privileged students consisted most of the time of biscuits sometimes flavored with ham or sausage and carried in a syrup bucket or paper sack. Students who carried their lunch became great traders. At noon, students couldn't wait to see if there were someone in the group who had something better to eat than they. Later, as economic times became better, a lunchroom was added and students were able to enjoy a home-cooked meal.

There is one feature about our school that sets us apart from the schools of today. Our school had problem-free bathrooms. We didn't have to worry about pipes breaking in the winter time, or commodes overflowing or getting stopped up. Those bathrooms were unique. In fact, they were so unique that they were given a special name --outhouses. They were called outhouses because they were out of the school building as far as you could get them. We had two of these outhouses, one for the boys and one for the girls. These outhouses graced our campus by being placed in opposite corners of the school yard. On cold, rainy and windy days, the teachers didn't have to worry about us kids wasting time getting to the restroom. If we gave in to go, we were back before the teacher could hardly turn around. One other thing about our bathrooms, the trustees didn't have to worry about budgeting money for Charmin.

The curriculum was simple. It consisted of reading, writing, arithmetic, history, and geography. Fancy subjects like science, and computers were unknown.

The mid-morning and mid-afternoon recesses and the lunch hour were the high spots of the day. Such games as Annie-Over, Crack-the-whip, Red Rover, or Steal-the-Bacon were played during recess. One would not forget the famous softball games that were played. It was always fun to miss class in the afternoon to go play softball at other schools.

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Holidays were special at our school. Plays were always presented depicting or relating to the various holidays. We were always allowed the necessary days to practice and decorate for the occasion. Sometimes this would mean several days of making ornaments or decorations or practicing for the play.

Our teachers were "Jack-of-all-trades." Not only did they have three different grade levels in each room, but they had the responsibility of teaching five subject areas to each grade levels. In today's terms, this figures out to about 15 different preparations per day. Talk about paperwork! Besides their teaching assignments, they were janitors, nurses, playground supervisors, cafeteria supervisors, fire builders, and anything else needed. There has never been a group of teachers so overworked and underpaid. We owe a lot to those teachers because they were truly dedicated to teaching kids.

The last day of school was always a big day. Everyone looked forward to bringing his lunch and going to Loves Lookout for a picnic.

"In our day cigarette smoking was okay for adults, grass was something the cows ate, coke was something you drank, and pot was what you cooked dinner in."<sup>1</sup>

"Most of us were before television, computers, word processors, electric typewriters, tape recorders, VCR's, FM stereo radio, and disco. In our day, hardware was a term used for hardware, and software wasn't even a word. We were before ball point pens, credit cards, and radar."<sup>2</sup>

Unique! You Bet!

We are the unique kids of Reynolds School. It is because of this uniqueness that we remember our days at Reynolds School. And because of our memories, we are here today -- to refresh those memories and to renew old acquaintances.

TECULA, TEXAS. Tecula, formerly known as Reynolds, is a farming community on Farm Road 2064 fifteen miles north of Rusk in northern Cherokee County. The area was settled before the Civil War, but a community did not develop at the site until the early 1870s, when the International and Great Northern was built through the vicinity. In 1873 a post office named Reynolds was established, and in 1875 a depot was built. The post office closed in 1875 but reopened in 1900, when Reynolds had a mill and gin and several businesses. The post office was discontinued again in 1907 but was reestablished in 1917, this time under the name Tecula. The Tecula post office was suspended in 1926, but the community kept the name. During the 1930s Tecula had a school, two churches, four businesses, and a population of twenty-five. The businesses closed after World War II, and in the late 1950s the school was consolidated with that of Jacksonville. In 1990 only a church and a few scattered houses still remained in the area.

**Martin & Bean Family**

Joseph Bean was the son of Samuel & Carmelita Rutherford Bean. Samuel Bean is believed to have been either the eldest son (by an earlier marriage) or a favored nephew of Peter Ellis Bean. Carmelita was the daughter of Joseph Rutherford who fought in the Battle of Bexar and was later killed in the battle at the Alamo on March 6, 1836. When Joseph Rutherford left Nacogdoches to go to San Antonio he left Carmelita in the care of Joseph & Delilah Dill Durst who kept and raised her after her fathers death. She married Samuel Bean June 1, 1843. Samuel died soon after their marriage. They had the one son, Joseph. Carmelita met and married William Martin August 27, 1846. (six weeks after he rode into Texas according to family legend). Joseph served in Co E Randals Reg CSA. Although his half brother Charley Martin spent most of the rest of his life trying to find someone who could verify Josephs death, it can only be supposed that he died at the Battle of Mansfield where it was known he was badly wounded. William Martin served in Co. F 35th TX Calvary CSA.

Dear father and mother I am well and is glad to hear that so you are all well I am sorry to hear that Charley White is dead for he was a good boy the health of the company is very good. William laird is sick and Ben McNeal is sick and Anderson Bolter is very sick at little rock but he is getting better. Paw I wat you get my blanket from Ben Whites if he hasn't gon two th war and if he has gon Ma two send me a bed quilt my blanket nearly worn out we are about 25 miles above little rock we took a trip up on White River we \_\_\_\_\_ of it while we was gon up there it rained twice on us the last time it rained we was camped in the river bottom the water run in our tents shoe mouth deaps. We never saw but three Yankees there and they was prisoners some of the boys went two little rock they have come back two camps. Wee have nothing two eat but beaf and bread and the beaf is as poor as it can bee. I expect we will be mounted again and I want you to have mee a saddle maid I have wrote you all the nuse tha I know that Yankees has left helena an the Mississippi River I heard that they taking gun boat up the Arkansaw river ever day and if they come to little rock we will give them a fight they have got a gun there that I can crall in it I think it could them in two bits if they was two run up there. Some of the sick boys daved som coffee and I maid it for them and they gim me cupful and that is the first I have had since I left home mabe so our regiment will come back to Texas after our horses this winter and if they wont do that I dont expect I can come at tall tell Reec harry folk that he is well the most of the boys is well give my best respects mar and all the children and my inquiring friends and receiv the same you self

I am sorry that I sent for my horse for I dont think their will be much chance to get a ferlow but horses is selling very big & maby I can seell him for a good price if I cant get to come home. I would like mity well to see you all & to be with you a while. I hardly know what to write that will intrest you. The health of our Co is not as good as what it has been. You can tell Mrs Harry that Rees is well he received a letter from her today the one she sent by Mr Colsby he was very glad to get it as it was the first he had herd from Charley since the fight. We cant find out where Sibbles (Sibleys) Brigade is Ma I want you to send me a couple of pair pants the first chance you get I believe thats all I knead at this time You can tell Mr McNeal that Ben is well ecept he has got the Arkansas Mange tell Bill Muck wife that he is well I must quit as I have to send this part of the way by hand the mail is not running from here now but it will commence next week I dont know how long we will stay here but you can send your letters to this place. Give all the family my best love & inquiring friends & to all the girles & tell them that I am coming back again Tell the boys that I would like to be theire to help them eat milk & butter & water-milions with them so good by

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I am trying to find out the relationship, if any, of my Jefferson Green BROWN to a "Love T. BROWN." Jefferson was appointed the administrator to this estate. The estate included a "Soldier's Warrant" of 640 acres. What was a "Soldier's Warrant" and how did one receive one in Cherokee County? Love T. BROWN (male or female ??) was apparently dead by 1849, as this was the time that Jefferson was appointed administrator.

Jefferson and his brother, Columbus W. BROWN, later left Cherokee County. Columbus died in Houston Co., TX before Dec. 1862. And Jefferson resided in Fayette Co., TX, before his death there in 1887.

At one time Jefferson Green BROWN had been a resident of Anderson County. He married his first wife, Nancy Jane PAGITT in Cherokee Co. in 1847. Their daughter Susan married J. Green LeGRAND. Their son Green J. BROWN died in Chireno, Texas. Jefferson married his 2nd wife, Amanda F. MILLIKEN (MILLIGAN) in Cherokee County in 1857. By 1861 (if not sooner) they were residing at Plum Grove, in Fayette Co., Texas. They had 4 children.

Jefferson and Columbus also gave their "power of attorney" to their representative, William C. DAWSON of Cherokee County, to act for them in the selling of land in Montgomery and Houston Counties which had been the land of Francis E. BROWN. I do not know the relationship (if any) between Francis and the two brothers, Jefferson and Columbus. Columbus, who died in Houston County left a widow named Sarah.

I know that Thomas BROWN who was born in Ireland was the father of Jefferson G. and Columbus W. BROWN. I do not know the name of their mother. A census indicated that she was born in Virginia. Jefferson was born in either Alabama or Georgia in 1824, and Columbus was born in 1831, in GA.

Any leads, clues, etc. as to how these various BROWNS were connected, would be most appreciated.

I have a copy of some records from an old tattered Green Family Bible. The first record is: "Rev. James Green departed this life on the 19th day of November 1856 in Cherokee Co. Texas 9 miles east of the town of (unreadable), age 78 years."

And the next: "----- Green, the wife of James Green departed this life on the 11th April 1868 in Robinson Co., died at the house of Hiram Walker her son, age 87 years as near as we can tell."

We do not know where Rev. James Green was buried. Do you have a record of any Green burials in that period of time in Cherokee Co.?

Rev. James Green may have officiated at marriages and funerals in Cherokee Co. in the years previous to 1856. I have not found any in my searching, and wonder if there is any record of his participation in such events.

We do not know who Hiram Walker is, or where he lived--not a son, surely, but probably a son-in-law. And perhaps lived in Robertson Co.(there is no Robinson Co.), but perhaps Hiram Walker was married to a Green daughter in Cherokee Co. Other Greens named are Thomas Green born July the 7 18-9, and William Green born Jan 21 1814. I would be glad to submit the records from this Old Family Bible to the Cherokee Co. webpage, but my ancestor (son of this James Green & Mrs. Green, Timothy Wilson Green, b Nov 5, 1815 TN, d 19 Jan 1869) was in Freestone and Leon Co., and records of his children's births more properly apply to those counties.
