The Committee appointed to examine the candidates made the following report:

We, the Committee appointed to examine the Candidates for licensure on Literature, make the following report: That we have discharged the duty assigned us and find the young brethren have made respectable progress in the principal branches of the English language and that Brothers **W. A. Burrows** and **A. W. Johnson** have measurably come up to the requirements of our book of discipline. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The following resolution was read and adopted: "Resolved that the name of Pine Grove Church be changed to that of Kickapoo."

Presbyterial business was suspended and the business of the Missionary Board was taken up and the following resolution read and adopted:

... in divinity, the Presbytery did and do hereby express their appreciation of all the parts of trial. And he having adopted the Confession of faith in this church and satisfactorily answered the questions appointed to be put to Candidates to be licensed, the Presbytery did and do license him, the said **A. W. Johnson** to preach the gospel of Christ as a probationer for the Holy Ministry within the bounds of this Presbytery or wherever God in his Providence may cast his lot.

The following resolution was read and adopted:

Resolved that the thanks of the Presbytery be tendered to the citizens of Larissa and its vicinity for their kindness and hospitality to its members during its present Session.

Ordered that a copy of the minutes of this Presbytery or such portion of them as the clerk may think proper be forwarded to the Editor of the Texas Presbyterian for publication. Minutes read and adopted.

Presbytery adjourned to meet in the town of Rusk in the county of Cherokee on Thursday before the first Sabbath in December next at 11 (eleven) O'clock A.M. Concluded with prayer.

Ministers absent: **Sam'l Harris, M. Priest, R. D. Thompson, R. Hodge, A. S. Hayter, S. A. Smith** and **A. J. Coupland**.

Licentiates present: **G. W. Barber**

Candidates present: **W. Burrow**

Candidates Absent: **G. M. Johnson & J. Grisham**

Elders present: **S. M. Thompson** from Randolph Congregation; **W. Johnson** from Knoxville congregation **M. J. Edmiston** from Trinity congregation; **B. Hollingsworth** from Kickapoo congregation; **W. Cunningham(?)** from San Pedro congregation; **R. K. Royal** from Athens congregation.

Bros. **Leland(?), Coupland, Hollingsworth,** and **Broughton** were appointed a Committee to see that the regular hours for preaching were filled.

Bro. Coupland's excuse for absence this morning was rendered and sustained.

Bro. G. Wagner, representative from Pleasant Grove Congregation, appeared and took his seat.

There being no other business before the Presbytery, **Bro. W. Burrow** proceeded to read a discourse from the text assigned to him at the preceding Presbytery. On motion the Presbytery adjourned to meet tomorrow at 8 o'clock a.m. Closed with prayer.

Presbytery met Friday morning at 8 o'clock. Opened with prayer. Ministers present: (It appears that several names were listed but not legible enough to read).

The Presbytery then proceeded to the election of officers; whereupon, **George Patton** was chosen as Moderator and **J. B. Renfro** as clerk.

Henry R. Morrison from Alabama Presbytery appeared and took his seat as an advisory member. **James B. Harris** was required to render an excuse for his absence at last Presbytery and his excuse was sustained. **D. W. Broughton** voluntarily rendered his excuse for absence from this Presbytery for three Sessions and his excuse was sustained. **T. N. McKee's** excuse for absence from last Presbytery was sustained. **D. W. Broughton's** excuse was sustained for failing to get here this morning at the opening of Presbytery.

Whereas, the minutes of last Presbytery relative to **J. M. Christi's** absence from the meeting of Presbytery in his case, Resolved therefore that the Record should have shown that his excuse was not sustained. **G. A. _____(?)'s** excuse for absence at last Presbytery was sustained.

(No other minutes are available until July 1861; then a meeting in November, 1862)

MINUTES JULY, 1861

...Whereas, while the discussion of the question was still in progress, **Brother Priest** arose abruptly and offered a protest, couched in language disrespectful, sarcastic, bitter, and highly personal and requested the same to be spread upon our minutes and, on an intimation that it could not be done, he asked that his name be stricken from the Presbyterial roll and, on being informed that the body had a right to do that, he and **Brothers Coupland, Thompson, and Kelly**, called for letters of dismission, which to give peace to the Church and quiet to the questions which have so long agitated, the Presbytery granted, with an explanatory clause, though the brethren stated that it was irregular and illegal to do so.

Resolved, therefore, That the disposition of the said pending question could not accomplish the object contemplated by the motion, since those who were conceived to be in error are no longer members of the body, and that the attention of the Synod be called to the preamble and resolution as an explanation for the condition in which our minutes are left.

Whereas, On yesterday this Presbytery did grant letters of dismission without endorsing the doctrines taught by them, to Revs. **M. Priest, A, J. Coupland, and R. D. Thompson**, under the impression made upon our minds by their own declaration that they intended to withdraw from our congregation, and await the action of the General Assembly, which this Presbytery in extra session had been _____(?), through leaving to them to memorialize.

And whereas the Rev. **M. J. Kelley** having been received by letter during this session of Presbytery from the Mississippi Presbytery, was granted a letter of dismissal & recommendation ; but which grant was reconsidered because he signified his adherence to the doctrine of brethren aforementioned. And on Motion, the same letter that he brought to the Presbytery was returned , hoping that, as he was a young brother, he might be reclaimed; but this Presbytery did not so dismiss him as to cut off his jurisdiction over him enthusiastically(?); and whereas all of the brethren named above retired from this body, as soon as their letters were attained, in a disorderly, disrespectful and insulting manner.

And Whereas said brethren did immediately proceed to organize themselves into a new Presbytery, under the style of the "American Presbytery" for the avowed purpose of propagating the doctrines taught in the "Gospel Standard," its "Apology" by **M. Priest**; and the "Gospel Standard No. 2," by **M. Priest** and **A. J. Coupland**, forming said Presbytery without the consent of this Presbytery or that of the Synod, and in open defiance of the same.

And Whereas, although we have granted some of them letters, we do not now, nor did we then consider them full; and even if we had granted them full letters of dismissal and recommendation, according to an act of the General Assembly, we still claim jurisdiction over them.

And Whereas, said brethren have openly declared that they will not desist from preaching those peculiar doctrines, but intend to propagate them, even at the expense of the interests of our own beloved Church of Zion.

And whereas, we regret the course of said brethren as a plain exhibition of the spirit of insubordination, and as a violation of their ordination vows in which they "promised subjection to their brethren in the Lord," and to "maintain the peace, unity, and purity of the church;" therefore,

Resolved, That the letters granted these brethren be and are hereby revoked, and that they be suspended from the functions of the gospel ministry until they make such confessions as are required by the Book of Discipline.

MINUTES OF DECEMBER, 1861

The Trinity Presbytery of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church met pursuant to adjournment at Mound Prairie, Anderson County, Texas, on Thursday the 19th day of December A.D., 1861, at 11 o'clock A.M.

Ministers present: J. L. Richards, J.J.A. Roach, and G. W. Acker. Absent: F. L. yoakum, T. N. McKee, W. P. Henry, J. B. Harris, J. B. Renfro, L. C. Philips, Melton Ostell, A. J. McGown, George Patton, and **J. Hickman**.

Candidates present: None. Candidates absent: **J. W. Dickey**.

Congregations represented: Mound Prairie - **J. D. Phillips**; Larissa - **D. S. Crawford**.

3 o'clock P.M. Presbytery resumed business. Presbytery proceeded to the election of Moderator and Church Clerk. Whereupon, Rev. **J.J.A. Roach** was elected Moderator and **D. S. Crawford**, Clerk. On Motion, the minutes of last session of Presbytery were read. Bro. Richards rendered his excuse for not attending the last Session of Presbytery, which was sustained.

Bros. **G. W. Barber** and **D. S. Crawford** were appointed a Committee in connection with the Church Session at this place, to arrange divine services during Presbytery. On Motion, Presbytery adjourned to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock A.M. ; closed with prayer.

Friday, 9 o'clock A.M. Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment. Constituted with prayer. Members present as on yesterday.

MINUTES OF NOVEMBER, 1862

...God's people in your bounds and the great cause of human Salvation under your care, seemed to be suffering. No revivals and no accessions to the church were reported, but since that time, God has greatly revived and encouraged some of your congregations and ministers, and they are stirring themselves to a sense of, and to some extent the practice of, their duty. We are pleased to inform you that there have been in your bounds, through the influence doubtless of your ministers and the blessing of God, near one hundred hopeful conversions to God, and seventy-five accessions to our own branch of the church. As another sign of good, some of your churches seem to be awake to the necessity of the gospel ministry, to their spiritual welfare, and the duty of supporting the ministry with their temporal things while being supplied with spiritual things.

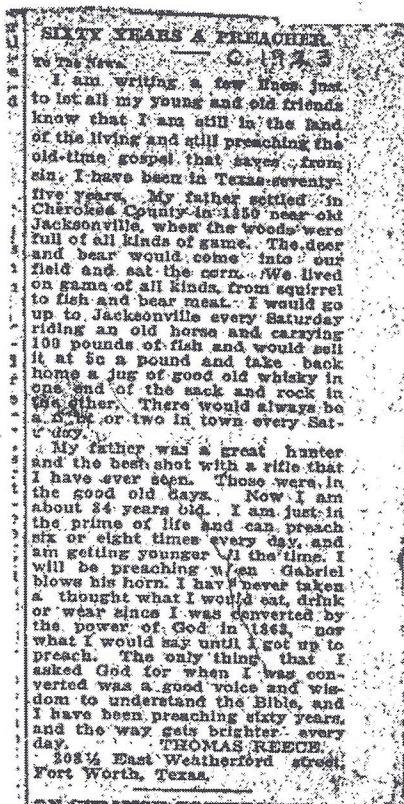
But, on the other hand we regret to say that from many of your congregations we have no news of any kind, they not being represented in Presbytery and have not sent up petitions to Presbytery for the services of your ministers; and, if they have the word and dynamics at all, the fact is not known to your Committee. And we recommend that the churches thus delinquent be still again urged upon to send up representatives to Presbytery, to make permanent and definite arrangements for the ministry of the Lord and report the spiritual condition of their congregations to the Presbytery.

In regard to Statistics, we have very meager data from which to draw, from the cause already mentioned. You have thirteen ordained ministers, and one licentiate. There are no candidates for the ministry in your bounds. In view of which fact, let it be urged upon the lovers of Christ and his cause to pray the Lord of the harvest to send more laborers into his harvest. As near as we can determine, there are in your bounds twenty congregations, fifty two elders, and four hundred and thirty three communicants. Respectfully submitted.

Thomas and Hugh Reece, brothers of Catherine Bengé and Susan Warren Saulters, were in the 12th Texas Cavalry, Confederate States Army. The picture and clipping c. 1923 came from my Grandmother Mollie Warren Bengé. She told of Hugh being wounded in the head and coughing the ball up later. She related another incident when her uncles were with a patrol. Camp had been made for the night, but after hearing a screech owl (a bad omen) the men became leery of the place and slipped away in the dark. Just after daybreak the campsite was over run by Indians.

Records shared with me by a new found and generous cousin, Bettye Smith, show Hugh was wounded at Yellow Bayou near Alexandria, LA in a skirmish with Federal Troops. As to the patrol incident, many Indians in the region did take one side or the other in that war.

It appears that Lewis was willing to part with his new acquisition, but instead of carrying out the contract the officer filed a complaint, in the justice's charging the possession of a fur animal during the closed season.

The accused plead guilty to the possession, but ignorant of the law, and was assessed a fine and costs amounting to something less than forty dollars, going to jail in default payment.

The next day the higher courts of the state held that justice's had no jurisdiction in cases where the collection of their fees was contingent upon conviction and the costs being paid by the defendant.

B. B. Perkins went before Judge Hodges, at Nacogdoches and procured a writ of habeas corpus, which was granted and both the accused and the 'possum were turned loose, the alternative writ being made returnable at the January term of the District Court.

Change in law pertaining to cemeteries by Bill Young

In the past few weeks, I have received several copies of new laws pertaining to old and new cemeteries. Included with the new laws were several opinions from John Cornyn, Attorney General of the State of Texas .

There are several paragraphs listed under section 711 of the Health and Safety Code which are very important. First, in section 711.041, it states that the owner of a cemetery or private burial ground must provide reasonable public access for visiting purposes. It further states that the land owner has the reasonable right to tell the visitors which route they must take to enter the cemetery. This part came about because of the huge ranches in western Texas where a small cemetery may be five miles or more inside the perimeter fence around a ranch. Ranchers did not want someone wandering all over the place. The land owner also has a reasonable right to say which daylight hours are best to go to see the cemetery.

There is another section (711.0311) that discusses the desecration of a cemetery. It is a third degree felony if a person destroys or damages the remains of a deceased person plus, it is a third degree felony if anyone obliterates, vandalizes, or desecrates a plot or other repository of remains. Both the prison term and the fine, if a person or persons are caught desecrating, obliterating or vandalizing a cemetery even if the cemetery contains only one grave are extensive. It also states that the person must make restitution by replacing any and all markers. Hopefully, these changes will greatly reduce anyone trying to destroy any part of a cemetery.

Another item that needs to be mentioned is if the land owner wants to remove the cemetery designation for a cemetery on his land, he may petition the State of Texas for a permit to remove the cemetery. Then the land owner must acquire another document from the local county judge giving him permission to remove the cemetery. Then the land owner must hire either an archeologist or a funeral home to remove each and every grave from the cemetery. And finally each burial must be re-buried in a perpetual care cemetery.

Hi, Mr. Bennett, sorry to bother you, but I have searched for days to answer my question and cannot seem to find the information. I have been working with some Hogg Family researchers regarding Gov. James Hogg's, grandfather, Thomas Hogg and his wife Martha Chandler. Thomas Hogg signed guardianship papers in Morgan Co., Georgia in 1818, for my ggg grandmother, Martha Ann Jones and her brother Richard Jones. Their parents were Thomas Ligon Jones (d. 1818) and Mary D. ?Hogg Jones (birth and death unknown). We are looking for the related family connections, if any. My ggg grandmother, as well, as Thomas Hogg, Joseph Lewis Hogg, Stephen Hogg, and Elizabeth Hogg m. Richard Jones (another one, not the child, but that's another story) all ended up, for a while in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. The Hoggs, Jones, and Baker families lived close to one another and purchased land together. They all left Tuscaloosa when the Alabama State Capital was moved to Montgomery. Our family stayed in Alabama. The Hogg Family moved on to Texas, via Mississippi, in the late 1830's.

We have been looking for many years for the will of Thomas Hogg. He is reported to have died "at the home place" and he and his wife are buried in Jim Hogg State Park. All of our information says that they lived in Rusk, Cherokee Co., Texas. The will is NOT in Cherokee Co. Tx. as far as we have been able to tell.

I seem to remember, from somewhere, that the home place was moved to its present location in the 1950's. Where was it before it was moved...across another county line, maybe, and if so, which county? I also have some memory of Panola Co. as related to the Hoggs, although I do not remember where I found that information.
