

as follows: My first husband Charles James abandoned me on May 15th 1857 without cause, and in my opinion left the State entirely, at any rate I have never seen him from that day unto this; I was married to William Hammett (my second and last husband) on October 16th 1862 without procuring any divorce from Mr James. A short time before I married Mr Hammett I made an effort to obtain a divorce from my first husband and went so far as to employ a firm of lawyers to represent me in Court, who advised me to get married without any divorce, as Mr James had been absent over five years and I would incur no penalty what ever. Under the penal laws of Texas, where a husband abandons his wife, goes beyond the State, or remains absent for five years the wife incurs no penalty by marrying again without any divorce from the absent husband; provided she did not know such absent husband to be living during that time, which was the case with me exactly, and that is why I married Mr Hammett without any divorce from Mr James.

I am not aided or prompted by any written or printed statement or recital prepared or dictated by any other person in making the above statement - The above testimony was written by Mr M L Earle at Jacksonville Texas on September 19th 1894 in my presence & only from oral statements then and there made by me to him.

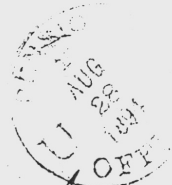

He remained here about 2 or 3 years, during which time he married a Miss Catherine Benge in this County, and deserted her without cause a short time afterward and has never been seen by her or any one else here since. She abandoned wife 5 or 6 years afterward married Mrs Hammett, and now resides here, and is the widow of said Hammett.

Cook at Jacksonville Texas, on the 18th day of August 1894 in my presence and only from oral statements then and there made by me to him.

Respectfully returned herewith is the above mentioned claim to the Chief of the Board of Review with opinion that the claimant is not the legal widow of the soldier. It appears that the claimant's first husband deserted her about five years before her marriage with the soldier. While the claimant might under such circumstances be exempted from the penalties prescribed for bigamy, yet such marriage was void for all civil purposes whatsoever.

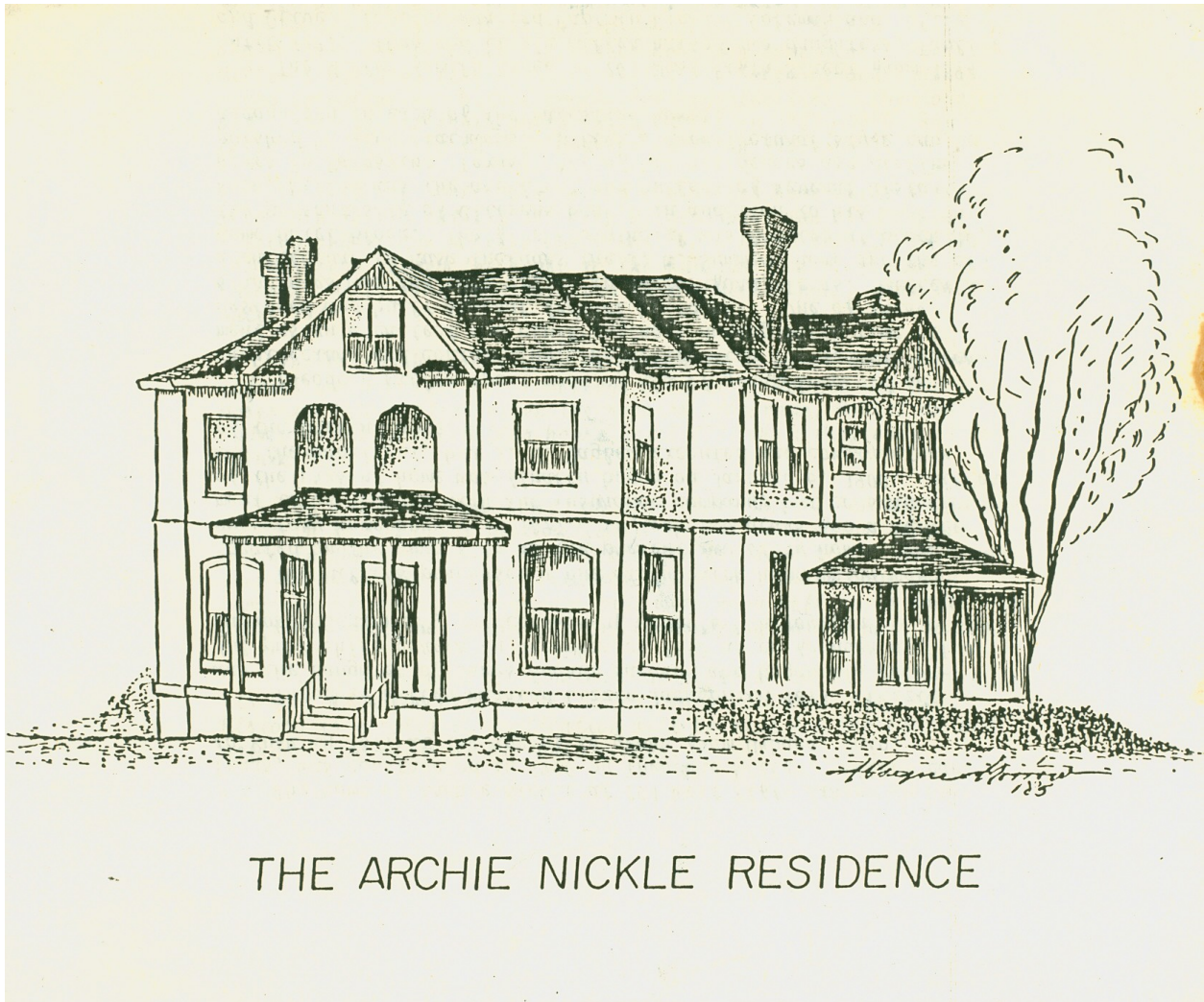

THE ARCHIE NICKLE RESIDENCE

The home of Archie Nickle at 201 West Fifth Street in Rusk, Texas, was constructed in 1900 by Theodore Miller. Miller came to Rusk in 1877 at the age of 26 years from Urbana, Ohio.

Theodore Mitten married Lizzie Jackson in 1878. Lizzie was the daughter of James Andrew Jackson who began his colorful publishing career in December of 1850 as co-Founder of "The Cherokee-Sentinel", predecessor of today's "Cherokeean".

The Millers purchased a one-story brick home which was located on the same site as the present two-story home. The one-story home burned in 1891. It took two years for a settlement to be reached with the insurance company, but construction of the present home was finally begun on January 6, 1900. Miller was the architect, but J. E. Bagley executed the construction of the present home.

Theodore Miller spent most of his 77 years involved in architecture and contracting. He worked with the federal government as an architect and civil engineer during which time he designed and built several federal buildings. One of these structures was the post office in

Weatherford, Texas. Miller's architecture in Rusk includes the J. W. Summers home and the old Acme Hotel Block.. The five-story hotel was located at Block 10, the present site of Citizens Bank. In addition to his work in Rusk, Miller was the architect and builder of several historic homes in Palestine, Texas. All of his residences ore distinguished by fine stairways. Miller's architectural style can be recognized in each of the Palestine homes.

The Miller family lived at 201 West Fifth Street from 1894 until 1927. Theo and Lizzie Miller raised two daughters, Pauline and Olive. Pauline married Captain Richard Coleman and Olive married Jack Taylor. The Colemans had one child who died at three months. The Taylors raised two sons. The Millers, Colemans and Taylors all lived in the Miller,\ home for some years after Miller's two daughters married. Later the Colemans and Taylors moved to Dallas for better employment opportunities. Theodore and Lizzie joined their children in Dallas in 1927 whence they lived until he died in 1929 and her death in 1936.

In 1927 Mrs. Dola Odom rented the Miller home where she ran a boarding house until 1934. The Miller house was sold to Dr. Moseley and Minton Moseley while Mrs. Odom lived there. In 1934 the Moseleys rented the house to the Edwards family who ran the Edwards' Mill. The Edwards lived in the Miller home from 1934 until 1949.

The Miller home was used as an apartment house during the fifties and sixties. The Moseleys sold it to Robert and Audrey Moses in 1970. After extensive repairs were made, Robert and Audrey lived in the Miller home until 1977 when they sold it to Archie Nickle.

The house was again used as apartments until 1980 when Archie moved in it and began restorations. He has made major improvements in the plumbing. John Nickle did the re-wiring. Ken Cooper from Jacksonville did the exterior painting. There have been numerous interior improvements made with many left to be made. In addition, there are plans for the landscaping in the near future.

Mr. Nickle hopes to continue the research on the history of his home with the help of his niece, Mary McElroy. After the history is completed, application will be made Or the state and national registers of historic places.

THOMAS W. ALEXANDER

We copied Benge Cemetery 1 July 1969 as a project of our local Daughters of the American Revolution Chapter. My group was Judy Ewalt, Doug Jamerson, Mollie Swink and my son Ray Huttash.

The first name alphabetically was

Thomas W. Alexander
9 Feb 1834 – 9 Dec 1907
Married Mary D. Boggs 25 Aug 1870

The references to him in CIVIL WAR RECORDS OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, TEXAS show him on the Relief List as having one dependent. There is a T. Alexander listed as serving from this county, and one T. M. Alexander who came to the county after the war. This is probably T. W. as initials were hard to read. And the unit was shown as Co. C – Forest's Cavalry. The Unit for T. was Co. D – 17th Texas Cavalry.

I did not keep the unit for TWA when I checked the "Big books" at Tyler. Will surely get the name next time. Needs to be re-done.

The widow is not on 1910 census. They are not on pension list from Cherokee County. The Mary Alexander in obit book was for a widow of John, not Thomas W.

No record of marriage in Cherokee County. Not on 1880 census, and not on 1870 census. But see what I found on the 1860 census:

And they are not on the 1850 census.

I tried to marry off the girls, with some success.

One Margaret married John Morgan in 1865. Ann E. married A. J. Bell, no record of Rebecca J. An Alzada Alexander married William Landrum in 1863.

And one we can count:

Harriet L. Alexander married Robert F. Benge in 1861.

Here they are on the 1870 census:

Their tombstones at Benge Cemetery show his dates 9 April 1839 – 26 Nov 1909, husband of Harriet L. Her dates are 7 Feb 1836 – 8 Feb 1908, wife of R. F.

Then I went to the index for TreeTalk, the genealogical publication of our society. There were two references to Thomas W. Alexander. This had to do

with research I did years ago on SUMMY. Sometimes there are good clues on the deeds.

Briefly, P-420 is where Thomas W. Alexander bought 106 acres from Claiborn Edmiston in 1860. Then in 1870 from Hayward County, Tennessee he gave R. F. Bengé power of attorney to sell this land. These were very hard times here, but Bengé sold in 1872 to Summy. TWA was still in Hayward County, Tennessee.

I checked the 1870 census for TWA in Tennessee and found two by the name but the age was wrong.

From 1872 to 1907 I can't put my finger on him! Give me a little more time, until I get to go to Tyler Library, and I believe he will be found. There is an 1880 census every person index done by LDS but I do not know how to use it.

At least I found the Bengé connection. And Robert was on same page of list of indigents as TWA. And one TWA drew a pension from Hill county, Texas.

So it goes.

04-04-04 At Tyler Library on Saturday:

I found Thomas W. Alexander's mother as head of the family in 1850 in Fayette County, Tennessee. Eliza was 45, Thomas W. was 16, Margaret J. was 18, Harriet L. was 15, Rebecca J. was 14, and James B. was age 7. Eliza was born in North Carolina. Sure wish we knew her maiden name as it could be her Cherokee County connection.

The problem, of sorts. One source in CSA I says TWA was in 17th Cavalry.

Copy enclosed. You decide. Forest's Cavalry was a Tennessee Unit.

There are 8 or 9 states but I did not have time to check Tennessee book.

I quite simply could NOT find TWA and his family.

Right now it looks like he served from Tennessee but what about our List of Indigents, those killed or wounded. He is on it. Only thing I know-without ordering pension of TWA from Hill County- is go over the 1867 Voter's Registration List. Will let you know the result. If you think of anything else I

could check, let me know I may get to go to Tyler Saturday, hopefully. Will check the book on Tennessee units.

Sorry this is so long. Just never learned to be brief.

Pension number of Thomas W. Alexander from Hill County is 07612. If you sent the dates on correct form for his birth and death, would Austin charge if it were not the one you want? Surely not.

I just thought he had been wounded to be on list of indigents. The fact that one is on list who came to county after the war could be checked in the office of the county clerk, in the basement.

Well, I just checked over 2000 names on 1867 Voter's Registration and DID NOT find TWA.

Guess what? I'd probably just use the Tennessee data from the 'big book' and get the marker. Or order the pension record.

Now You Tell Me
My Father's Memoir
by Richard Sory Robertson

My dad wasn't in a Family Memoirs Writing Class. But he was an active and prolific letter writer. I have many letters he wrote to me while away at college and in military service. And I have a collection of postcards he sent to his family in the early 1900's.

In the absence of memoirs we rely on oral history from our loved ones and I did learn some things about his past from sketchy stories. But he was not loquacious and in my senior years I have yearned to know more about his early life. Help has come from my late mother by way of my niece, Cordelia, daughter of my late sister.

My Mother, Bon Craig Sory Robertson, was an amateur genealogist when letter writing was the principal means of gathering family information and she wrote and saved carbon copies of the mass volume of correspondence generated. She traced the Sorys of Jacksonville, Texas back through East Texas, Tennessee, North Carolina and Virginia. She also saved all manner of newspaper clippings, bulletins, photos, letters received, books and paraphernalia. My sister inherited all of these and they ended up in her cottage at Grace Presbyterian Village in South Oak Cliff. Cordelia, "Dee Dee", periodically finds something in all the boxes etc that she thinks I might want and brings it to me. And some of these "treasures" are mind-boggling rich. The WWI Diary of my father revealed more than I could have ever imagined about him, his experiences, and a personal story of the War.

Recently she brought a new "treasure" from the past. It was a 3" thick, 11 1/4 by 12 1/4, heavy duty cardboard file box with the word "Letters" on the spine. These file boxes were commonly used in offices and homes for many years before the computer age. Inside were many treasures, including love letters from my dad to my mother, correspondence to mother's Aunt Sue and to our young family, and the makings of my dad's memoir to me!

I knew that my dad was the only one of eight siblings of Norwegian Farm family Wisconsin parents who went to college. And I knew that he first went to school at Galesville, Wisconsin. Ten years ago I contacted the archivist office of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America seeking any information as to his attendance at Gale College. They were able to send me a copy of a picture of the class of 1913 and a list of members of the class of 1910, both including him. That was the extent of anything I had relating to Gale College other than old snapshots that were either there or at Park Region Luther College where he attended in 1913-14 .

Galesville, Wisconsin is in western Wisconsin, just across the Mississippi river from Minnesota. It is in Trempealeau County which became somewhat famous when, in 1886 a Methodist preacher name D.O. Van Slyke wrote a book entitled "*Found at Last. The Veritable Garden of Eden*" in which he describes that area as the place that

answers the Bible description better than anything yet discovered. His statue is near the town square and there is currently an organization entitled the Garden of Eden Preservation Society.

The town as well as the college was named after Judge George Gale. It was chartered in 1854 and first operated by the Methodist Episcopal Church, then the Presbyterian Church, and in 1901 transferred to the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Church. In 1910 it was probably more like a junior college as we know about them. In 1939 it was closed permanently after mounting debts.

So my dad's memoir, nearly sixty years after his death, was in the form of twenty four documents entitled either The Gale Pennant, Gale College Bulletin, or Gale College Family Album. In addition there was a small folded program with a ribbon entitled "1910" giving the commencement exercises for that year.

Now he had told me that he first graduated from Gale in 1910 from a One Year Commercial program which has later been described as offering "standard business college courses — secretarial, accounting, and general business." The Pennant describes each graduate. My dad: "Disposition —Studious. Member of Olympia. Ambition — to become a banker"

He did not leave after that graduation and obviously continued with the predominant curriculum of a junior college of liberal arts. The November Pennant indicates he is the President of the Junior Class and has a full page article written by him entitled "Gale College Fifty Years Ago." He gave a brief history, subjects taught, places from whence students came, and credentials of the faculty. Apparently my socially shy father was rather outgoing in his younger years. A write-up of one program said "A good program was given by the Juniors, the class President Mr Robertson giving us an address of welcome in the brogue of a newcomer....Mr Robertson was toastmaster and conducted his duties in the Norwegian language. All the toasts were given in Norwegian, which was very appropriate on such an occasion.."

I had always wondered where he got the nickname "Deacon". I knew it was at some time when he was in college because when he was later at St Olaf College he received a post card addressed to "Deacon, Northfield, Minnesota" which I still have. So the Pennant article regarding "The Juniors of 1912" calls him "Deacon." Also in that class was Paul Bjerking, his lifelong friend who later operated a farm in Wisconsin that we visited in 1935. We have some letters between the two of them in the early thirties when Paul had built a radio on which he hoped to hear the broadcast attempt to reach Europe from WFAA in Dallas when my mother was one of the soloists. Now I know the connection. Another connection I discovered was classmate Arthur Hanson whose name was written on the back of a picture with my dad. We now know the picture was at Gale College.

As a senior, Dad became the Editor of the Pennant and graduated as the Valedictorian. His speech was published and said what is normally expected at graduation. In part he said “.....Fellow members of the class of ‘13, after these days of toil comes the parting time. To part with you is like leaving brothers and sisters. Our companionship at Gale is at an end. It has certainly been a most pleasant and agreeable one. As we are leaving the doors of the school behind and entering upon our future, we feel how inadequate words are in expressing our appreciation of what the school has done for us.....” Etc, etc. Interestingly the “Graduates Directory” lists his ambition as “Mechanical Engineer”, a far cry from “Banker” in 1910 and his ultimate career as a Tax Auditor.

Thanks to my Mother’s sense of history and family, the Gale College era of my Dad has been revealed. He went on to Park Region Luther College, graduated from St Olaf College, and went to Law School at the University of Wisconsin. Would that I had recordings of some of his stories from those days!

Northcutt and Some Connections By Ogreta W. Huttash

The first reference found so far on Northcutt is in my first probate book when the estate of Riley Pierce was being settled beginning in 1864. The slaves had been freed. The appraisal had been in Confederate money. The farm had been rented out to Robert Northcutt in 1868 to put it in repair. He later bought the farm.

Bodecia Ann Northcutt is mentioned on pages 125 and 166. In April 1850 John Bass was appointed guardian of the person and estate of this minor who was about 15 years of age. My comment was that she was on the 1850 census, Residence 41, with John Bass, age 54, and his wife Mary, age 51. She was shown as age 14. James K. P. Dye, age 5, was also in this household. Later on, in 1864, Mary Bass left her entire estate to be equally divided between James K. Polk Dye and his mother Margaret J. Partlow. The Dye divorce was started in October 1847 when she sued Weldon S. Dye for divorce, one of the first- if not the first - in the newly formed Cherokee County.

In November 1851 John Bass, guardian of person and estate of Bodecia Ann Taylor, late Northcutt, was to give more security as H. H. Mallory had asked to be discharged as security. She had married Samuel P. Taylor 24 October 1850 (A-148). Just what estate Bodecia Ann had is not made clear. She was the daughter of Anna Bass and Robert Northcutt, and her grandfather Jordan Bass had died 1841 in Talladega County, Alabama according to a chart by Doris Cook Stadler. Could it be from her grandfather on her mother's side? Or could it be from her grandmother who came to Cherokee County, Texas with her children. This would be Bethenia Bass who died here before September 1856. Her age on the 1850 census was shown as 90 years. That estate settlement is interesting because bond was \$5,000, customarily twice the value of the estate. Her son Willis was administrator. I used this in Tree Talk once. Then Mae Gear Pettit used it in her genealogy. Her estate became worth about \$12.50 of personal property all of sudden. Looks like the heirs reached an agreement among themselves.

John Bass made his will 11 February 1852 and died the following August. The will was six pages long. He left everything to his wife Mary Bass during her lifetime. No children were mentioned. Various heirs were mentioned and one was Margaret J. Partlow. There is no mention of Bodecia Ann Northcutt; she was not a legatee. He did leave his brother Willis Bass 100 acres of land and a slave and he left his nephew Aquilla Pierce \$100 to be paid at the death of his widow Mary Bass. These relationships are mentioned in the will.

Now back to Robert Northcutt From our 1986 CHEROKEE COUNTY HISTORY:

Page 71. One of the "really old settlers of Reynolds community southeast of Mud Creek" was Robert Northcutt in 1872. Actually he had been here 8 years at the most.

Page 213. Article by Doris Cook Stadler stating he married Anna Bass.

Page 457. Article says he married Eliza Lawson, came to Cherokee County after 1864, and lived in Tecula area, and that his daughter Ella married Riley F. Pierce. [This would be based on the census which shows Ellen Northcutt was born in Louisiana and was age 6 on the 1870 census.]

Page 552 is an article on Samuel P. Taylor and shows Bodecia Ann's parents and marriages.

Robert Northcutt is not found on the 1870 Agricultural Census or the 1870 Tax Roll. He is not in the New Summerfield book. I've found no tombstone listed and no obituary.

Next door at Residence 300 with Nancy White, age 50, is Ben Northcutt, age 28, boarder.

Notice that Eliza Northcutt is shown as mother of John and Ella and that she is a widow. This indicates that Robert Northcutt died before the census was taken. My probate books end before this time but the children probably divided the farm after the death of Eliza Northcutt. Census records are not perfect but are usually a reflection of what the enumerator was told. This looks like Eliza was John's real mother.

A digression. Of interest. An obituary is in Helen Crawford's Obituary Book III, for 1910 – 1921, page 19, dated 6-23-1911:

.....
JOHN NORTHCUTT, age 61 years, who lived two and half miles north of Reynolds, was instantly killed Saturday when he went to bring some stock to the house. A mule kicked him with both feet, one hoof struck him over the heart and he died almost instantaneously.

Mr. Northcutt's wife died several years ago, and he lived with a son and four daughters. He also had two married daughters and two sons living in Oklahoma. He was interred at Mixon. A sister, Mrs. Pierce, was burned to death at Reynolds two years ago last Christmas.

.....
This appears to be Ella Northcutt who married Riley P. Pierce in August 1884. He was called "Pete", according to Mae Gean Pettit on page 36 of her book MUSICK, LANGSTON, PIERCE, McELROY AND SOME OF THEIR PIONEER CONNECTIONS 1600' – 1800's, 1994. There are over a dozen Northcutts in her index.

And this is one place to find the BASS genealogy for several generations. Her great, great, great grandmother Nancy Bass married Riley Perce in 1821 in Jefferson County, Alabama. Nancy Bass' parents were Jordan Bass who married Bethenia Gay. She says they lived in Round Lick settlement of Wilson County, Tennessee. By the 1820s they were in Jefferson County, Alabama and by 1840 were in Talladega County, Alabama.

In brief, Nancy Bass who married Riley Pierce and Anna Bass who married Robert Northcutt were sisters. And Willis Bass and John Bass were brothers. [Others not listed here.] So when Robert Northcutt rented the farm he would have been kin to the children by the first marriage of Riley Pierce.

Back to my PROBATE RECORDS OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, TEXAS 1846 –ca 1875. Just happened to look above the estate settlement of Riley Pierce and noticed that his wife Mary died first and her estate had not been settled at his death two years later in 1864! So to Helen Crawford's probate book.

She also had "Mary" Pierce – but his wife was Nancy Bass! The MYSTERY was solved in our 1986 history which has an article stating Riley Pierce married a Mary Wood and reared a second family.

In conclusion, Bodecia Ann Northcutt is the connecting link to two patriots of the American Revolution: JACOB BASS (1740-1792), father of Jordan Bass, and the second patriot being JOHN GAY, the latter being the father of Bethenia Gay who married Jordan Bass.

Bodecia's mother Anna (Bass) Northcutt has the distinction of having two grandparents in the American Revolution - but Anna never came to Texas. And think of Bethenia (Gay) Bass, a daughter of a patriot, who was nearing 90 years of age when she came here to Cherokee County.
