Letter from Ellis M. Roach to her sister, Sallie Farish

Pine Town

November 20th

1859

My Dear Sister

I received your welcome letter two weeks since; and was glad to hear that you all were well, my health is improving. I have not been in good health since my baby was born. Tell Mama she has another grand daughter. She is seven weeks old. We call her Mary Jane. Mr. Roach and the children are in good health. Jean and Georgey are going to school from home this session to the same teacher. They ride a little pony. They are very fond of going to school.

Mr. Roach has gone to church today to hear a farewell sermon from our little preacher who has been preaching for us three years. He is a fine young man and a good preacher. I felt this morning as though I was taking leave of a near relation. Our little church will miss him very much. It is a hard matter to get a good preacher here.

I do not think you will be able to make this scrawl out. One of my eyes are sore.

You wanted to know in your letter if we were coming home this winter. I am not at leave to know what to say to you on the subject but I will tell you all I know. As soon as Mr. Roach can sell his cotton and land he wants to settle up and divide Keeling property. He is anxious to get through with it and I know I am for if we do not have but one dollar I want to call that my own. I like when I tell you anything to be certain of it. That is if life last it is Mr. Roaches intention if he can possibly settle up this winter to visit you all next March or April. I have been from you all seven years and 3 days and I will not think that I am going to Virginia until I start. Mr. Roach says him and Mr. Herndon made a calculation and it will take seven hundred dollars to carry us there and bring us back. I told them it was not recorded that I should return and I told them if we had to make a fresh start in the world I had to see Mama once more. He says he cannot make a support there but I tell him that we were raised there and both of us get our growth.

Everyone says after I go there and look at the old country I will be willing to return. I tell them I must see for myself. I have no idea that Mr. Roach will be contented there. He says if he had plenty of money he would prefer living there but Texas is a poor mans country. You have no idea how many poor people there are in Texas. It takes all they have to bring them here and many of them would leave but they have not the means to leave with. They are moving constantly from one portion of the state to the other. You rarely ever see a family but they are willing to move. That is one reason there are so many poor persons there. They use the greatest quantity of coffee, tobacco and snuff you seldom meet with a lady young or old but what they use snuff and tobacco. Mr. Roach married a couple last Thurs and he said there was one hundred and fifty persons and nearly every lady after supper had a pipe in her mouth.

Would you not think they were well smoked? At 4 this evening he is to marry a couple in the neighborhood.

I have nothing more worth writing. Mr. Roach joins me in love to all. Farewell my dear sister. May heavens choicest blessings rest on you all is my sincere prayer. Your sister

Letter from Ellis M. Roach to her brother, Thomas Farish

*Pleasant Valley
August 16th 1860*

Dear Brother,

I received your most welcome letter some two weeks since and should have answered it before now but your children were sick and I concluded not to write till they were better, knowing it would make you feel uneasy. Jean had quite a spell of pneumonia and was very sick for a week and during this time Bod had a spell of fever and just as soon as I could went after Jean and George William and brought them to our house. It was a damp evening and it make her cough worse. She coughed all night and indeed for several nights she slept but little (her or any one else) but she is a great deal better. Her appetite is very good and she is improving fast. George William has a bad cold and has cried two nights with the ear ache. One night I thought he would have spasms. The next time he did not have it so bad. During the time Johnny was sick with fever for several days. I never had my hands so full in my life.

Mr. Rose (?) was not able to walk but little from a tick bite on his `foot and a large kernel in his groins from which he suffered greatly. I think the place where the bite was will rot out. I have been poulticing it for a week. The inflammation is out and the swelling has gone down. I hope it will get well now.

The children have fine appetites and you ought to see them eat. The summer has been so very dry we have no vegetables at all. But thanks to the giver of all our blessings we have plenty of old corn yet, and we will make enough for bread. We have not gathered it yet. William says he thinks we will (get) eight hundred bushels. There are a number of families that will not make corn to last them till Christmas. What they will do I cannot tell.

There has been an insurrection anticipated. It was to have come off the first Monday in this month while the men were at the election. They were to kill the women and children. Parson Hodge happened to hear loud talking late at night and listened, heard the whole plot. They hung one of his servants and I do not know how many more. One of Witherspoons servants was implicated and took four hundred lashes before he would own it. They hung two abolitionist at Tennessee Colony and whipped three free negroes so that they died. The excitement is abating some but every suspicious person is made to give an account of themselves. The towns Dallis and Henderson are burned up and Rusk and Palestine are guarded every night.

Nannie and the children are well except colds. I saw her Sunday at preaching. Your children are well and grow fast. Johnny and Bob know most of their letters. Mr. Rose bought them books in Palestine and they seemed very proud of them. I want Jean and Georgia to stay here till school commences.

Letter from Ellis M. Roach to her brother, Thomas Farish

Brother Thom, you do not know how glad I was to receive a letter from you. I could not help crying for joy. Be assured my dear brother, you are not forgotten in your affliction, nor your children when they are sick. I do every thing in my power to relieve them. I take them in my room and nurse them. And when they are well I try to make them mind what I tell them. They ask a great many questions about when you are coming home and their little sister. I received Sallie's letter and answered it. Glad to hear from her. Jean wants to write to you in my letter. My love to all enquiring friendly and receive a portion yourself.

Dear Pa

I take the oportunity of writing you a few lines to let you know that we are all well. I am at this time staying with Aunt Bet. Uncle Billy is making corn enough to make his bread. Mr's Horn and Griggs are making very good crops. You can only imagine how I want to see you. George is a good and industrious boy. I had the pneumonia last week and Dr. Cornish attended on me and have a very bad cold yet.

Nothing more of interest but remain your affectionate daughter.

Letter from Ruth Farish to her sister, Sallie Farish

Meadow Hill
Sept. 2th 1862

My dear Sallie,

I will first tell you of the health of our much loved sister Becke, who died calmly and peacefully the 27th of June. I never saw one more resigned to death in all my life, she bore her sufferings with patience never murmured, she confined six weeks her bed, some of us stayed with her nearly all the time; she left a message for all of her sisters and brothers, said we must write and tell you and Mr. Roach to meet her in Heaven. That she was most there, spoke of the letter she received from you said she wanted to answer it but was not able. She was buried at Rural Villa by the side of her little boy. Ma told cousin Jimmie she would take the babe and do by it as she had by Mollie, he would not consent, the babe is very delicate, has been quite sick, Mr. Walker was very kind to Beck, waited on her so kindly, was there when she died. The neighbors were all very attentive.

Mattie lost poor little George Buckner the 6th of May, died with croup, she was greatly distressed, she has full assurance that her tender lad is free from the sins of this world and is safe in Heaven. I will not dwell longer on this sad subject.

Ma says I must give her love to you all and longs to see you again. Sallie, I often wonder if you want to see one as bad as I do you. I am writing by candle.....I would begin it perhaps might get 2 wks in Bowling G. sometime shortly, and finish this week, and send it any how though some say it can't pass. Tell Eugina I will write to her before long. I was very happy to receive a letter from her, hope she will continue to write, Mollie says I must tell Jenie she has a cat called Gen. Lee, wants her to name one after him. He is a big yellow cat, she thinks more of him than she does of Beauregard. Bob makes a great pet of Mollie, she is still in love with D. Allen, says D. do love me, and sometimes D, is in love with me, she is the smartest gal in these parts, the greatest talker and sings most all day. I wish you could hear her trying to sing my Maryland. Bxxxie used to be a favorite with her. Mother and Uncle Hyters went there last week, she has been spending a good portion of her time at North Point this year.

-ath-- has been sick this summer, is quite delicate, she is coming here soon to spend some time, Bellis??? Is with Gen Stuart over in Maryland: have not seen him since the first of August. He has not had rheumatism much this summer. Sister Mary is getting along finely, has another boy called John Wesley, she is anxious to come up, will do so as soon as the cars commence to running again. They have not been to Jimmey's since the 24th of May. They are expected up this week. The sounds of them will bring joy to my ears and I hope will bring a line from some of the absent ones.

I have formed many acquaintances in the last seven months, some from every state in the Southern Confederacy, some of the nicest gents apparently I very met with. Some spry officers. I hope I shall have the pleasure of seeing them again.

Letter from Ruth Farish to her sister, Sallie Farish

Sallie, when we were left up here in Yerheadom??? You can't imagine how I felt, folks were afraid to travel about much for fear of meeting the foe. Though they were quite polite, I did not feel afraid of them towards the last atall. Gemmie says she has never had a letter from you since you left. Sister Sarah was down last week, staid several days. The enemy destroyed her corn and vegetables, did not loose any of their servants. We did not loose any of our female servants only the six men who left in April. One caught, some lost all they had. The Corbins have to do their own work cooking, milking and everything. Cousin Bob and Dick Jesse fortunately captured most of theirs on their way to the Yankees. Though they lost three men. Nancy, Aunt Polly, Aron and their children did not go. Dr. Anderson lost all of his but four, lost seven most valuable. Mrs Lotehfield lost two men, Mr. Boulware lost E__es, Margaret and Ann, both are left without husbands. Mr. B___ lost ten, Uncle Farish lost three young men. Cousin Jimmie did not loose the first one or Mr. Hugh Campbell.

Kate says she expects to be married in a few months to some 1st Lieut. Of the 2nd Va Artillary, he has been sending pastry and letters to her. She like him __rotrate???. She _____ Allen. Clemmie says she is going up to Brother Georges soon and will carry Mollie. She can't go anywhere and leave her. Brother George has been in two battles, came off unhurt. He is now waiting on the sick in Richmond. Brother Haye comes up to Richmond sometimes to hear the news, he's been buying up medicines to speculate on. Mr. Cr___ has made a great deal this year, made so much of his garden some days cleared 50\$.

We have not seen Sister Mary since she left. Clemmie says she is going down to see her very soon and spend some time. Goods are very high in Richmond. Ladies seal skin shoes 15\$, domestic cotton we used to get for ten cts have to pay a dollar a yd. Calico one dollar; everything high, bundle cotton seven dollars. We have not had any dresses woven since you left. The girls said to wait until after this war to get dresses. I guess I can make out. Unless I should chance to get married. Lucie F. and I spun some knitting so fine. Kate never thought I would spin a hair but these times I _____. Kate says she would like to send you enough to knit a pair. Ellen is a right good _____. They will go to school this fall to Sarah Ann Boon, four of them. I feel so sorry for the poor children so early bereft of a fond mother. The Lord knew best. We should not murmur. Beck died with consumption.

I have just learned that letters can pass from here to Texas. Since the enemy have been in possession of New Orleans, it has been useless to write as they would not go. Some say they can pass now, but I hope this may so for we are very anxious to hear from you all. We got two letters from you two day since one dated May 19 and one June it seems that the old mail is just coming in, for old Caroline has been a sleep for some time past. Hope she is wide awake now and will stay so.

When our Army fell back it was a sad time with us but Thank God we did not see us bad times as we expected. When the Vandal foe came through old Caroline, they were very polite to us and not do much, when here, took about eighteen bushels of corn, one hen and the old big white rooster. Had there ??? a ???, The first who came along the 5th of July, I never was as much

frightened in all my life. I thought Kate would go in _____. It happened those did not stop, went as far as the bridge then came up the hill and went off immediately. After that time they continued to come every day or two for about three weeks, Kate and I had some chat with an officer. I asked him which got the best of it at Richmond. The Confederates or Federals. His response was they killed three to our one. I told him it was doubtless a mistake of his. I then asked if he thought there was any chance of Peace. He said there would be peace if we would yield (to) the old United States flag. Kate responded to him by saying our men would loose their last breath in war before they would yield. He then said good evening ladies and off he went. I will now tell you we are getting along all very well except a soldier who is here with rheumatism, a very young man of Jackson Co., Va.

I will now tell you about little Mollie. She is well all (except for her) ear, which makes her a little fretful. She is a great ____ with us all and everyone who comes here takes a great deal of notice of her and she is not afraid of any body in the fondest. ____ trying to write, says she is going to write to Sal, talks a great deal about you and knows all of her Brothers names and can say Gennie so sweet and talks about Mr. Roach and calls him her Brother. I wish you could hear her talk to this soldier who is here. He call her snaps??/ sometimes, she walks up to him and shakes her fist at him and says I am major Mr. Por is naps???, she borrowed his pencil the other day and told him she was going to write to Sal in Texas. She knows everything you left here that was yours. Roberta Allen of N.C. sent her a doll. When Bob came from there he spent some months in the old North State. While the Yankees were in Caroline visited the parents of the boys who staid here last fall. Poor Hodge and Smith are both dead. Senas killed in battle, xxx died in C..... with fever. Also, Mr. Franicki died in the hospital near Richmond. Bob saw H and ? and Mr. Frenrich buried. He was at their House when the remains of them were carried home. Smith's remains could not be found on the field. His father sent some one to see if the poor fellow could be found but all search was vain. Billie and D. Allen are still in service. Dick Jesse has just left here. Wishes me to present his respects to you and all. He is at home on sick furlough. Xxxxx down quite often to see us. Mimmie and I rode up there last weekend. I have taken Roderick for my pony and Jimmie rides old Bet. She is as fat as a seal. We were compelled to sell our carriage horses. The Yankees would certainly have stolen them. Sold them for three hundred seventy five. It grieves us much to part with them, most everyone sold their best horses. Those who did not had them stolen. Sis Jesses old bi horse was taken. A Great many darkies have been captured since Fredricksburg has been evacuated by the enemy, one of ours Jim Cousin. Jimmie Dillard sold him in Richmond. Only got 500\$ for him. More than we expected. I never thought he would bring much. It is likely some of the others will be caught.

Letter from Ruth Farish to her sister, Sallie Farish

Bless the Confederate xxxxx after this is the best we can do in Caroline. The gals and boys write to each other on Direct to Ganey's ?? The mail will soon come up there again. Remember us to all. I would like to send a letter in this to Eugene but have not time. Will send her one before long. Tell her to write often to me.

Letter from Ruth Farish to her sister, Sallie Farish

Meadow Hill
April 30th, 1863 (?)

Dear Sallie,

I feel really badly for not writhing to you ere this, but hope you will forgive me. I will say in the first place we are all well. The state is in great confusion. We have a large army stationed at Gimmey's. We are expecting about 60 thousand. I heard that Jeff Davis is going to have all of his army in Virginia and Tennessee and is going to carry the war in the North. How glad I will be.

Servants are leaving in large numbers from this county. 13 of Uncle Hyters have left, 15 Uncle Row's, 6 of ours, men they are John Tom and Dicla are left. The women say they're not going but I don't believe them. As for my part, they may go. Gro. Hase is here but will not take any with them. He came for that purpose, but it is said if we send the servants away it will be very bad for us. The Yankees will treat us badly for it. I have not heard of any body sending them away except Dr. Holloway, and all of Mrs. H's family will have to leave.

The day Fredricksburg was taken by the enemy Jack was missing and has not been heard of since. Recon he is with the Yankees. Last week Charlie Farish, Keeling Ballard, Branddus, Bob Anderson and two other gentlemen were scouting in the neighborhood of Dr. Goldem's at night. They stayed in the Dr.'s office, at 2o'clock in about 200 Yankees were there, fired in on them, killed the two last mentioned. Took the others prisoners. Uncle Card ? H. was very much distressed. Uncle H. does not go home at all. Aunt R. is at her Father's. Kate and Mary are in Richmond. We are anxious to go south but Mama is not willing. Bro. George is in the army, has been in one battle. Fought like a man. Bob is in Richmond, was well the last we heard from him.

Uncle C's family are all well. Mattie is at home and ???? at her Father's. Billie is in the army, enjoys good health. Mister Beck's health is not good. The children are all well. I have not heard from sister Sarah for a long time. How are you all getting along. Hope well. ____ wrote to Little Billie, get very sweet letters. I expect 1st N.C. Reg. at Gimmey's every day.

The neighbors are growing but little in their gardens. Our flowers were beautiful this spring. Have you many flowers? Mr. Cromie was here last week, all were well. Sister M. got a letter from you, also sister Beck. We have received three Little Mollie, is the sweetest little think I ever sw. Repeats Pasty??? Very sweetly very often, says she wants to see Jay? Bad, says I am going to send Jay flowers. I do wish you could see here. How is Mr. Roach's health. Mr. Jeff Raes passed here when the army fell back to Gerktown so one of the men told me. I asked after him quite often. He would have called if he had to have known we lived here. Please excuse all mistakes. You and Mr. R write to me. Give my love to all. Mama and the girls join me in much love.

(in the margin) The two boys that were killed were strangers to me. Mollie made these marks, says she will write today.

(The first battle of Fredricksburg was fought Dec .11-15, 1862, which makes me think this letter was written in 1863) Tim Taylor, transcriber and great-grandson of TJ Roach, husband of Sallie Farish Roach, his second wife, to whom this letter was written by her sister in Caroline County, Virginia.

Finding Biographical Data in Secondary Source Materials

Biographical sources can be the building blocks that spring us back into older generations of data. They can fill in missing pieces of our families' histories as well as provide us with more documents with which to solve inconsistencies and voids in our research. They can really assist us in finding all the evidence for our ancestors. In a very meaningful way, those secondary sources we call biographical materials can help us fulfill the very first requirement of the genealogical proof standard, that being a thorough and reasonably exhaustive search.

Biographies and genealogies are closely related. A basic difference between genealogical materials and biographical materials is that genealogical materials tend to be much more "vertical" in scope and depth -- multi-generational, while biographical materials tend to be more "horizontal" in scope and depth -- usually the information provided primarily focuses on a single individual and covers no more than two or three generations, often his or her children and his or her parents. Biographies tend to not go back as far in terms of generations, but they give you more detail about the person than a typical genealogy does.

There are various types of biographical compilations. The most well-known are the geographically based compilations. Many hundreds of town and county histories have been published over the years with the majority of them sporting significant biographical sections. Many of these biographical sections consistently have been knocked either for only covering the rich and famous or for being greatly embellished accounts of individuals' lives. While there may be truth to those allegations, why not look for information on one's ancestors anyway? Lead generation can be a wonderful thing; one can pull out all kinds of clues to follow up with additional research. In addition, typically the smaller the town or community the more individuals of all walks of life get included in the biographical sections.

In addition to the geographically based compilations, one can find ethnic, religious, occupational, organizational, and event-based biographical works. If one's ancestor was a brewmaster, a search for the brewing history in his region could reveal biographical details.

In trying to find biographical materials, it is vital to understand how and where historical information tends to be archived and made available. Local public libraries strive to have all the published materials for the areas they serve, whether a town, township, county, or region. That makes them good sources for all kinds of biographical compilations, both the usual and expected as well as the unique. Many state libraries act like the public library for their respective states, collecting heavily in published material such as newspapers, church histories, locality histories, and of course, biographical compilations.

An excellent, free tool for discovering biographical works for your areas or topics of interest is WorldCat.org. This bibliographic database contains more than two billion catalog records for more than ten thousand libraries worldwide. If a biographical compilation exists, it's likely WorldCat will have a record describing it.

Even better than knowing about these biographical works through WorldCat is accessing a number of the actual entities through some amazing websites. Both FamilySearch's Family History Books (<https://books.familysearch.org>) and the Internet Archive (<https://archive.org>) have growing silos of online publications including complete local histories and biographical collections. The Digital Public Library of America (<https://dp.la>) has more than twenty-two million items available for free access on their website. The HathiTrust (<https://www.hathitrust.org>) offers a comparable number of works to the Internet Archive. Why not take a look and see who's who among your ancestors?

Sometimes a number of us shy away from derivative/secondary sources such as biographical materials in our family history research. We have heard so often and with such passion that original/primary sources are where it's at--are what we should seek and focus upon obtaining. I certainly am not going to argue with that; however, I have found that so often it's in the thorough and consistent use of derivative sources that one finds the maximum number of original sources. Those biographical sources can be a boon to our research.

Charles Johnson Gattis

Pvt. C J Gattis was in Co K, 2nd Regiment, Georgia Reserves. His Confederate record also had an alternate name: Charles J Gaddis.

Mr. Gattis was born June 6, 1846 in Floyd, Cobb County, Georgia and died in Cherokee County, Texas October 28, 1928. His death certificate gave his parents as David Gattis born in South Carolina and his mother Jane King born in Georgia.

In 1870, Charles Gattis lived in Georgia with wife Adaline and Ellerly Gattis age 16. Elry Gattis was Charles' sister.

In 1880, Charles Gattis lived in Anderson County, Texas with wife Aline and two children. He is listed as a farmer.

Mr. Gattis filed for a Confederate pension August 30, 1913 in Cherokee County, Texas and it was approved September 1, 1913. It appears from his pension file, Mr. Gates went to visit in Georgia in June 1915 and had plans to be gone for only two or three months but circumstances kept him away from Texas until October 1916. He had to get several Interrogatories Witness in pension claims to re instate his confederate pension. His pension file also had a copy of his application for Mortuary warrant stating he died on 21 day of October 1928 in Troup, Texas. He was living with a nephew, J D Gaddis.

Pvt. Elias C Stockton was in Co. I, 17th Regiment, Texas Cavalry (Moore's Regiment). He enlisted in the war April 1862 in Rusk, Texas for 3 years. He was age 42. He appears on a roll of non-commissioned officers and privates employed on extra duty at Austin, AR during the month of October 1862. He was listed as a butcher. He was last paid August 31, 1862.

On April, 24, 1862, the regiment transferred to Arkansas where it was assigned to First Brigade, Second Division, Trans-Mississippi Department. By August 1862, the Seventeenth Cavalry dismounted prior to the engagement at Arkansas Post on January 11, 1863. At this battle, the majority of the unit's members were captured. The men that were taken prisoner at Arkansas Post were transferred to Fort Delaware via Camp Chase in Ohio. On April 29, 1863, they were exchanged for Union prisoners and returned to service in the Confederate Army.

Elias was already in Texas by 1850 living in Cherokee County, Texas with wife Amanda and three children.

In 1860, Elias was still in Cherokee County, Texas with wife and nine children.

Elias was born in Tennessee in 1821. He died February 16, 1863 during the Civil War at a regiment hospital in Arkansas. His Confederate records stated that he died at a Regiment Hospital February 15, 1863 but not notified until 7 June.

I did not find a burial location for Mr. Stockton but his wife Amanda Stockton died January 7, 1895 and is buried at Tecula Cemetery.

George W Grimes

Pvt. George W Grimes was in Co. K, 6th Regiment, Texas Cavalry (Wharton, Stone's)

Mr. Grimes was born on April 16, 1848, in Elba, Alabama. He was the son of Isaac and Sarah Ellen Wilkinson Grimes. He married Josephine Stockton on January 7, 1873, Jacksonville, TX.

Josephine Stockton was the daughter of Elias Conal Stockton and Amanda Elizabeth Bell.

He entered the Civil War at age 24, mustered in at Dallas, TX, September 12, 1861 for a period of 12 months. Number of miles to rendezvous was 40 miles. His horse was valued at \$150.00 and his equipment at \$20.00. The \$20.00 was hard to read but I think this is correct. He was discharged at Camp Flat Creek with papers and statements. He was discharged November 5, 1861 and paid November 11, 1861 by J Ambler.

In 1850, George was age 2, living with his parents and six siblings in Coffee County, AL.

In 1860, George, age 12, was living in Cherokee County, Texas with his parents and six siblings. A Robert S Grimes age 20 was living with them. He was not listed on the 1850 census and not sure of the connection.

In 1870, George is 22, living with his parents in Cherokee County, Texas and 7 siblings.

In 1880, George is still in Cherokee County, Texas and married Josephine Stockton in January 1873. They have five children.

In 1900, George and Josephine are still in Cherokee County, Texas and have five children living with them.

In 1910, George and Josephine were in Cherokee County, Texas with one child.

In 1920, George and Josephine were living in Cherokee County, Texas and living with them was one daughter with a grandson. George was 71.

George W Grimes died February 24, 1924 and is buried at Tecula Cemetery in Cherokee County, Texas. He was listed as a farmer during his life.

George R L Stockton

Pvt. George R L Stockton was in Co. K, 37th Regiment, Texas Cavalry (Terrell's Regiment). He enlisted in the war January 4th; year was blank from Cherokee County, TX for 3 years. This record was hard to read. Two pages of his Confederate record had dates of 1863 and 1864.

George was born about 1844 in Itawamba County, Mississippi to Elias and Amanda Stockton. George and his family lived in Cherokee County, Texas in 1860. George had eight siblings.

In 1860, George was living with his parents in Cherokee County, TX and nine siblings.

In 1870, George lived in Cherokee County, Texas with his mother. It appears on the census record that George's brother William was living next door with a wife and several of his brothers and sisters.

In 1880, George lived in Cherokee County, Texas, listed as a widower and had three children, his mother and two brothers were living with him.

In 1890, Mr. Stockton married Nance Ellen Baldwin on June 29, 1890 in Cherokee County, TX.

I found four marriages for George Stockton.

It appears George died before 1900, maybe 1897. I did not find where he is buried.

Mr. Stockton's wife, Nancy Ellen Stockton is buried at Tecula Cemetery. She died May 3, 1935.

John Nunum Johnson

Pvt. John N Johnson was in Co F, 4th Regiment, Texas Infantry.

Mr. Johnson was born June 1845 or 1846 in Marshall County, AL or Cherokee County, AL. It seems he was married several times but when he was living in Anderson County, TX. In 1900, he was married to Annie Lee Rhine.

In 1860, John was age 15 living with his parents Jeramiah and Harriet Johnson and one sister, Abagill, age 13. Jeramiah Johnson was a Baptist minister in Rankin County, MS. His parents were living in Cherokee County, AL when John was age 6.

In 1870, John was age 25 living in Lauderdale County, AL with wife Mary. He was listed as a farmer.

In 1900, John was age 53 living in Anderson County, TX with wife Annie and 10 children. The 1900 US Federal Census stated she was married 19 years and had 5 children. The 1900 Census also stated this couple had 10 children born in Virginia, Mississippi and Texas. The last two children were born in 1892 and 1896 and born in Texas. The first son was born in 1868 in Virginia, the rest of the children were born in Mississippi.

In 1910, John was age 64 living in Anderson County, TX, widow with 2 children.

I found an application for a Widow's Pension dated 8/28/1923 filed by Mrs. J. N. Johnson. The pension was filed in Houston County. The pension stated that Mr. Johnson died the 15th day of May 1923 in Cherokee County, Texas. She stated she was married on the 15 day of April 1919 in Anderson County, Texas. She also stated they had lived in Texas about 23 years and lived in Cherokee County, Texas 4 years. The question was asked if her husband drew a pension and if so, what is his file number. The answer to this question was yes, but I did not see a file number in her pension record. She stated he was in Hood's Brigade, 4th Regiment.

I also found a pension filed by J N Johnson, Sr in Anderson County, TX dated Aug 30, 1913. Mr. Johnson's stated he was honorably discharged or surrendered 16 miles from Richmond, VA at close of Civil War between the States. His pension stated he was 68 years old, born at St Claire County, AL. He said he enlisted October 1861 and served until 1865 close of war. He was in Company F, 4th Texas Regiment, Hood's Brigade. He was a Private in the Infantry.
