MY GRANDPA: BROOKSIE CAMPBELL By Eileen Stike Jones

My maternal grandparents, **Brooksie and Ruby Campbell**, were an integral part of my growing-up years. As far back as I can remember they were a part of my life. I was their first grandchild and the first of their total of five grandchildren. He nicknamed me **Sugarpie**. Because we lived fairly close, we got to see them often. Grandpa never served in a war, was never in politics, was not high on the social ladder, never famous or widely known for any outstanding feats. His schooling went only through the third grade, but you would never suspect that, as he was a very smart man. He managed his schedule well and all that his job required. He was a big man in my eyes.


My grandpa always expected combread and biscuits every day for lunch when he was not out of town on a run so, of course, Grandma complied. Grandpa would always work the crossword puzzles in the daily newspaper. He was tall and lanky and when he played "solitaire" he laid the cards on the floor in front of him, then bent over at the waist and played the game. He smoked and rolled his own cigarettes, using Prince Albert tobacco. In those days women usually didn't smoke cigarettes as it was considered unlady like but Grandma did. She smoked Kools which supposedly had menthol in them. The day Grandpa died he said, "Mama, how about letting me have one of your cigarettes." For years she thought she was keeping her habit of smoking from him. In fact, when I was there she would tell me to watch and let her know when he was coming and she would quickly hide her smoke in the stove drawer.

Mervin Brooks "Brooksie" Campbell was a real character. He liked to spin yarns and could really come up with some good ones. He told of African safaris and other imagined adventures. When my Uncle M.B. was in elementary school he told his teacher about his daddy hunting lions, etc., and the teacher sent a note home to invite Grandpa to speak to their class. Naturally he had to decline and although he was a little more cautious, he continued his spinning.

Brooksie's grandparents, **William B.** and **Amanda Campbell**, left Alabama around July of 1852 and settled in **Cherokee County**, **Texas** in a place that was later known as **Larissa**. While doing some research at the **Jacksonville Library**, I came across a book entitled, *Larissa* which spoke of **William B**. being a cotton ginner, a Methodist and a Mason. There was even a photo of **Campbell's Mill** located on **Killough Creek**. His oldest son **William Hill Campbell** was said to have graduated Valedictorian from Larissa College in its only graduating class. Brooksie himself was born in Larissa.



Interestingly, my grandparents met at the funeral of grandpa's daddy, **Young Brooks Campbell**. Grandpa told me of his walking from Frankston to Tyler several times just to see my grandmother. They were married in 1915, in Smith County, Texas. To this union were born three children: a boy born and died in May of 1916; a girl **Malvern Lois** (my mother) born in July of 1917 in Tyler, Texas, and died in October of 2004 in Houston, Texas; and **Mervin Brooks Jr.** born in September of 1922 in Tyler and died in May of 1975 in Houston, Texas.


When the family lived in Houston, Grandpa would get the "itch" to go to Tyler, and regardless of the weather, he would take off. Grandma made sure however, all bills were paid before she would agree to go. His job on the railroad was such that he could do this because his was not an 8 AM-5 PM job, but was gauged by trips. One time he decided to go and evidently the San Jacinto River was out of its banks and covering the road. The roads were just dirt and not paved as they are today. Grandpa got a man to have his horses (or mules – Mother couldn't remember which) to pull them through the Huntsville area. He noticed a bridge he needed to cross was about to collapse. He backed up the Model T he was driving, told Mother and Grandma to hang on (Mother was in the back seat), then stepped on the gas. They practically flew over the bridge but made it safely. The bridge, however, caved in so they returned via a different route. Mother said when they had a flat tire they simply plugged it with cardboard from ZuZu ginger snap cookie boxes. Mother was about 6 when they bought the black Model T, which was a used car. Whenever it rained they had to put up the plastic windows.




One of the stories Grandpa liked to spin included directions on how to catch a wild animal. He said, first you had to get it chasing you. Then you ran in the back door of your house and out the front, closing the door after you. You would then run around to the back and close that door so the animal couldn't get out. I'm not sure what you were supposed to do then as he didn't say and no one thought to ask. At any rate, the cousins fell for it hook, line and sinker. Travis, one of the cousins and Aunt Ruth's third child, told me his Uncle Brooksie (my Grandpa) showed him how to set traps, fly kites, etc. He also told me that Grandpa advised him the way to catch a bird was to put salt on his tail. Right! But first he had to get close enough to do so.

Grandpa worked first for the **IGN** (**International Great Northern Railroad**), then for the **Missouri Pacific Railroad**, ending up as an engineer driving the trains. When they lived in Houston the train came by on the tracks right behind their house. He would blow the whistle and I would run out and wave to him. After they moved to Palestine I often rode the train there to visit with them.

The train depot in Houston was right where Minute Maid Park, home of the **Houston Astros Baseball Team**, now is on Texas Avenue in the downtown area. As you can see in the photos below, the Union Station went through a number of changes.








On March 2, 1911, the station was dedicated. It was three stories tall and covered the entire block on Crawford Street between Texas Avenue and Prairie Streets. The firm of Warren & Wetmore designed the building, the same firm responsible for designing New York City's Grand Central Station. Passenger service reached its peak during the 1930s and 1940s. At the end of the 50s passenger traffic was on the decline and air travel was the wave of the future. The last passenger train pulled out of Union Station on May 31, 1975.

When Grandpa was on the passenger run for a while, he usually drove "**The Texas Eagle**," formerly known as "**The Sunshine Special**," which was quite a popular run. He decided, however, he would rather drive freight trains because there was less responsibility. Most of the older railroad men wanted the passenger runs because there were set schedules; but not my Grandpa!



Recently, in one of my daily devotionals I read an article entitled: "GPT: God's Perfect Timing."

It started out by saying, "In the days of American rail travel, nothing was more important than the timepieces kept by engineers. These pocket watches had certain operating specifications that allowed for exactness and accuracy even if damaged or jarred. If the train operators didn't have synchronized watches, disaster would ensue in the form of train collisions." This reminded me of my own grandpa's pocket watch which I have in my possession. I remember him having to take it to a jeweler's shop in downtown Houston ever so often just to get it checked.





When I once visited the train museum in Galveston, I took the following photo depicting the various railroads. Most of these came through the Union Station at Houston at one time or another.



Grandpa, as one might expect, was a dreamer. He had always said he didn't care anything about buying a house, but boy did he change his tune when they bought their first house in Palestine Texas! You would have thought it was all his idea. He really threw himself into making it his own. When they first moved there, the yard was full of bull nettles and grass burrs, but with much concerted effort on his part, the intruders were soon gone or at least under control. Grandpa always took care of all he owned. It seemed like he was always checking the fluids in the car, etc.

For as long as I can remember, Grandpa drove a train. He retired in 1962 with 42 years of service with the railroad. Today I understand computers are used to operate the trains. Grandpa died in 1963. I wonder what God has him working on now.



Funeral Services for Dan Bradley Cates, 88, Alto, Texas will be held at 2:00 PM, Thursday, April 27, 2023, at the Cold Springs Methodist Church located on FM 220 off Highway 21, west of Alto, officiated by the church pastor, Rev. Tim Ross.

Informal viewing is scheduled at the O.T. Allen & Son funeral home Wednesday April 26th from 9 AM to 5 PM. Formal visitation will be held in the church fellowship hall prior to the funeral service beginning with a noon meal. Additional visitation with a light meal will be held at the family residence in the Cold Springs Community following burial in the old section of Old Palestine Cemetery located east of Alto.

Dan Bradley Cates was born on the Cates family farm in the Cold Springs Community on March 15, 1935, the youngest of nine children born to John Early and Mary Vera Dominy Cates. Mr. Cates attended early elementary school at Cold Springs, graduated from Alto High School in 1953 while running the family dairy and playing football. Mr. Cates served in the US Army as a Quartermaster clerk in Korea and Japan. Mr. Cates attended Stephen F. Austin State University on the GI Bill graduating in 1960 with a B.S. in Forestry.


Mr. Cates was employed by the U.S. Forest Service from June 1960 to January 1992 as a professional forester, first in Florida, where he met his future wife. They married in 1966. Mr. Cates was later stationed in Hot Springs, Arkansas, before being transferred to Crockett, Texas, in 1973. In 1980 the family built their home on his share of the old Cates Family Farm. In 1992 Mr. Cates began a new career as a cattle rancher within a mile of where he was born and reared.


Mr. Cates was a member of four genealogical societies: Cherokee County, Texas; Angelina County, Texas; Augusta, Georgia and the Old Edgefield District, South Carolina.

He is preceded in death by his parents, 3 sisters, and 4 brothers.
